PROTECTIVE TARIFF.

It is said the President intends to make tariff reform an administration measure by setting forth his views in his forth coming message. This is a sensible move. The present high protective tariff is one of the parents of the corporation pooling and monopoly that is the greatest evil of our times, and itself the parent of anarchy, which is therefore the grandchild of high protective tariff. That tariff is itself a pool agreement between large manufacturing interests (the pets of Blaine) to secure high prices for their products and to "stand in" with each other in enforcing the scheme. In this way that great revenue arm of the United States government is converted into an engine of oppression for the laboring masses, at the same time that Mr. Blaine tells the workmen that it is a protection to American labor. Recently the representatives of fifty three window-glass factories of the country met in New York and pooled on that article to advance the prices, and to "stand in" together. They can carry out that compact because the high protective tariff is on their side. The United States government thus helps fifty-three manufacturers to rob the millions of consumers. So in Pennsylvania lately the anthracite collieries organized a similar pool to limit the output of coal for twelve months and advance the price first 25 cents and then 50 cents a ton, throwing out large numbers of laborers and levying a heavy tax upon millions of the people. It is thus by the fraudulent use of these great engines of government the few are enabled to rule the many and rob them of their pleasure. This is the old doctrine of Alexander Hamilton and of the present chiefs of the republican party put into active practice. Its effect is seen in the thousands of millionaires and the millions of paupers and in the strikes, discontent and anarchy all over our country. Mr. Cleveland is acting wisely to "take hold of this root of the greatest evil of the age, and to urge a heavy reduction of tariff duties. He would do well to urge so far as inter-state commerce is concerned, a revival of the old common law statutes against such combinations for raising prices. The United States government should no longer hold down 50,000,000 of people, while the half million of monopolists rob them. —Eve. Dem.

The Coal Monopolists.—If the man who is well to do pays five dollars or more for a ton of coal how much does it cost the poor man who buys it by the bucket? The winter is at our doors. Jack Frost has already made us a flying visit, and soon he will write his name on the window panes. Unless there is coal in the grate the children in ten thousand lowly homes will freeze and young men will seek the warmth of the saloon. The want of fuel for four months in the year will drive women to despair and men to crime. If the laborer who earns his dollar a day is compelled to pay at the rate of six or seven dollars a ton for coal, because he buys it in small quantities, who is at fault? The coal companies, as related elsewhere, consist of men already rich, but anxious to be richer. They have raised the price of coal by combining for that purpose. By the spring they will each be able to build a new house out of their profits, but by the spring there will be a good many funerals because wages are low and coal is dear. That's the whole story, and an infamous story it is.

The United States has the most thorough, expensive, and effective system of public education of any country in the world. Its public schools include 10,738,192, youths and its private schools 606,517, out of a total school population of 16,510,463, showing that 67 per cent of the school population of this country is receiving education. To instruct these boys, 307,804 teachers, three-fifths of them females, are required. The income of schools in 1884 was \$110,567,567, the expenditure \$103,949,528, and the value of the school property \$230,636,426. For public educational purposes the States expend one-third as much as the cost of the entire General Government.

The New York "World."—This journalistic marvel of the age has a supplement showing up its wonderful subscription and advertising patronage. The supplement also sets forth the prospectus of "The World Literary Union," which proposes as a premium a sewing machine at \$22 worth \$65, and a reduced price for books. It gives these to its old subscribers as well as new and affords it by having the companies take their loss out in advertising through the World. It printed in 1885 a total of 51,242,367 papers. This world of ours is evidently after conquering this other world of ours by the dizzy magnitude of its circulation.

Boston Herald.—"Suppose the Chinese government should send out a set of missionaries to this country to teach our people the duty of humane treatment toward the Chinese citizens who have the fortune to be colonized in our cities and frontier towns. It would find a field in which Christian work has either been remiss or has been exerted to a great extent in vain; but we fear that the missionaries themselves would be not much safer than those they come to aid, and China would not stand alone as a nation opposed to missionary effort.

Henry Ward Beecher has been dogmatizing against dogma in his claracteristic way, during his visit to England.
