IMPORTANT ORDER.

On the 5th day of October 1886 the Secretary of War furnished the Headquarters of the Grand Army of the Republic with a memorandum of an act of Congress by which it was ordered for the information of all soldiers of the late war of the rebellion, and members of Grand Army of the Republic in particular, to publish to the people of their respective communities that, "at the last session of Congress (at the August 11th, 1886) provision was made for continuing the work of furnishing headstones for unmarked graves of soldiers, sailors and marines in city, town and village cemeteries and other burial places; and the War Department has accordingly made arrangements for supplying all that may be required to the 30th day of June 1887."

Comment Not Necessary.

As shown by the President in his message there has been a reduction in the expenses of the government in all departments, except in the pension office, where there has been an increase of nearly \$8,000,000. We especially invite the attention of old soldiers to this fact. They were told when Mr. Cleveland was a candidate that if he should be elected no more pensions would be paid. But here is an actual increase of nearly \$8,000,000. Comment not necessary.—Albany Democrat.
