A WAGON ROAD.

EDITOR REVIEW: Has appeared from time to time in our local papers articles extolling (very truthfully) the climate, productions of the soil and the great wealth that exists in the timber, coal and minerals, which are known to be within Douglas, Coosa and Curry counties, inviting capital to utilize, but when men arrive seeking homes and locations for investment, they are surprised to find no way to visit this territory except on foot, and few guides to be found, therefore go away leaving we have humbugged them. There are no roads but one Coos bay wagon road crossing the Coast Range mountains the dividing line between the counties mentioned. The easiest and often the quickest way from Roseburg to Coos bay is by way of Portland and San Francisco a distance of over thirteen hundred miles. This should not be so, as the distance from Roseburg to Empire City is only seventy five miles by C. R. W. R. which is often impassable except at foot. A good wagon road can be built down the middle fork of the Couville river to Myrtle Point, a distance of sixty miles from Roseburg, which there are only twenty-six miles to build, nine miles in Douglas county. Coos county has heretofore expended much money and labor on this route and a small outlay on the part of Douglas would enable us to make a road that we could drive a team and wagon to the coast this fall.
