That not every one succeeds in poultry raising is often to be attributed to uncomfortable poultry houses. All fowls require some place for comfort and health. When left to themselves to roam all over a farm, they become unprofitable to their owner, a burden to themselves and a nuisance to the ment, however, will prevent them from health. Lime and carbolic acid sene, and fully as cheap. If poultry are not protected from the cold of winter, they become torpid; if exposed to great heat in summer, they become enfeebled. To avoid the numerous dise ases which are brought on by damp ness, care must be had that the house be in a dry location, and properly deley, also, is a good diet, and, in winter, fended from rain and storms.
