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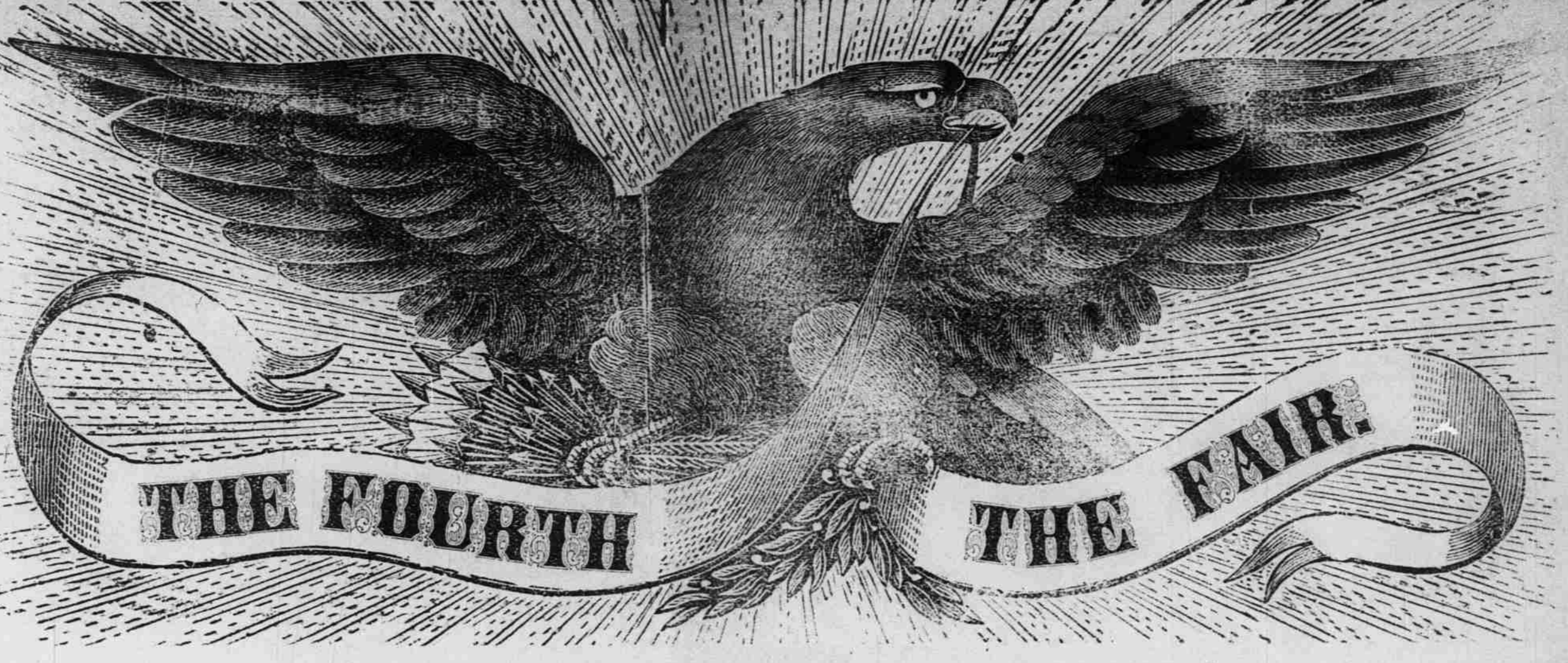

LECTURE ON OREGON SOIL.

The following is a brief abstract taken from the able lecture delivered by Dr. Thomas Gordon of the State University before the Farmers Institute recently held in this city.

The speaker said: Art always precedes science in the same field; the art of making bread was made earlier than the science of bread making; the art of building went on for unnumbered ages before the science of architecture had its beginning. So in the field of agriculture, the art of soil culture is very old, the science but recent. The art looks only to the effect the science of the cause. Science begins by asking for the origin of soils. The speaker here exhibited specimens of rock in which disintegration toward soil had made different degrees of progress in the same material plainly showing, in shaded bands, the changes they had passed, from the hard unchangeable rock to the crumbling shale just ready for the plow. He claimed that all soils had their origin in such disintegration of rock; the soil addition in nature being the carboniferous added from the decay of vegetable growth on its surface. The plow, the spade and the hoe, only continuing the work where nature leaves it.

The lecturer next explained how this disintegration works in granite removing first the potash or the soda from the felspar, then making a like raid upon the mica it contained, for its most valuable ingredients until nothing left but a heap of quartz granules as a mass of sand. A like process of disintegration was described making a like attack upon basalt and porphyry reducing these to soil like that of the soluble part of the granites.

The lecturer then spoke of the fine soils of the limestone slopes of Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties, the product of the mingled material crumbled from the granites, shales and limestones of the surrounding mountains. Some soils were formed when the rocks are found. The rock decomposing in place through the action of atmospheric agencies; others were formed on rocky outcrops and successive rains washed the loose particles down into gentle slopes along the valleys; others yet are muds sedimented of former waters into which streams and rivers washed these water materials.

Of the rich and abundant soil of the Willamette valley the lecturer spoke next, he said the vast body of the sediment of the Willamette valley was the gift of a large body of water that rests between the Cascades and the Coast range of mountains ever since early Tertiary times, deep, rich and abundant. The lecturer next considered sources of waste in soil wealth and among these mentioned overflowing by waters with its power to remove the soluble materials, to wash them into neighboring rivers and thus out of the country. He pointed out as instances in point portions of Linn and Benton counties from which everything soluble had been washed away leaving thousands of acres pale as putty and almost as adhesive.

RECREANT MINISTERS.

UNFAITHFUL TO THE CHURCH OF THE UNITED BRETHREN IN CHRIST. YORK, Pa., May 14.—At a day's session of the general conference of the United Brethren in Christ, a resolution was adopted declaring Bishop Milton Wright and certain delegates, including A. J. Jones, of the Oregon conference, to be no longer ministers or members of the church of United Brethren. These members are charged with having vacated their seats in this body, and joined in the formation of another church organization. It was unanimously agreed that the bolters be declared no longer ministers or members of the church of the United Brethren in Christ.

The minority convention was addressed by Rev. G. W. Stoney, of Illinois, who said: "Run and secret societies go together."

THE UNITED BRETHREN CONFERENCE. YORK, Pa., May 15.—Bishop Weaver presided over the majority conference of the United Brethren church to-day a motion to license women to preach was adopted after a long discussion. A motion was adopted that no minister should be allowed to preach more than three consecutive years at one point without the consent of the conference.

The minority conference was presided over by Bishop Wright. It was agreed that four bishops should be elected, one for the Pacific coast and three for the East. It was recommended to call a congress of Christian churches in the fall, in some large city, to urge a war against secret societies.

At the majority meeting held this afternoon resolutions were adopted expressing hearty approval of the action of the general conference in ratifying the work of the church commission appointed by the last general conference, thus bringing into force the revised confession of faith and amended constitution of the church, and protesting against the use of the church name by seceders.

MARRIAGE OF MRS. FOLSON.

JACKSON, Mich., May 22.—Great interest was aroused in society circles yesterday when the rumor became current that Mrs. Emma C. Folson, mother of Ex-President Cleveland's wife, was to be married to-day to Henry F. Perrine, a merchant of Buffalo. The wedding was solemnized at 9 o'clock this evening, Rev. R. B. Balm, of St. Paul's Episcopal church, officiating. The bride was attired in a traveling costume. Mr. and Mrs. Perrine left on the night train for Chicago and the West for a trip, before returning to Buffalo to reside. Mrs. Cleveland will remain for a few days, the guest of Mrs. Colman, before leaving for home. The groom is about fifteen years the senior of the bride, who is a well preserved woman of 45.

SCULLING RACE.

Lee the scullers, arrived in Seattle this morning, and have already begun training for the race which is to take place on Lake Washington on Memorial day. The course will be three miles and turn.
