One crew of men is engaged in erecting a shed at Spruce Point under which rock aways will be built. Another crew will go to the mouth of the river to-morrow and begin clearing away from the mouth of work on the bunk and mess houses.

Two young ladies from Dayton visiting a family near the Baker school house, when the alarm was rung, were awakened from their slumbers and without waiting to don their evening attire rushed into their room and did not stop until they reached the scene of the fire, although the distance is over a mile.

For the privilege of carrying on their lottery scheme the New Orleans lottery managers offer to pay \$250,000 for the purchase of the rights to the lottery. The lottery is to be held in Louisiana, \$50,000 to the city of New Orleans, for postage and other incidental expenses, \$100,000 to be paid quarterly in advance. The total amount of the bribe offered is \$1,300,000, payable in twenty five years.

The proportion of travelers killed in railroad accidents in France from 1875 to 1880 was one to every 24,000,000 of passengers, and one wounded to every 1,000,000. In England for the same term one to every 11,000,000 passengers was killed, and one to every 1,000,000 passengers was wounded. In Belgium between the years 1875 and 1880 one to every 6,280,000 was killed, and one to 720,000 passengers was wounded; in the United States there was one to 3,500,000 killed, and one to 425,000 wounded.
