In prominent papers of Eastern Oregon there now appears an advertisement offering a reward for information leading to the return of little Alina Miller, aged 6 years, who disappeared from her home near Summerville, Union county, on September 20th last. I. W. Miller, the father, has been incessant in his search for the little one since that date, and on Sunday evening arrived in Weston. To a Weston Leader reporte Mr. Miller related the circumstances of his little daughter's sudden disappearance. She went out of the house to play during the early afternoon and has not been seen since. No tracks or trace was left by which to obtain a clue, although several hundred citizens immediately organized and thoroughly searched the surrounding timbered country. 
