CHANGE THE CAPITAL.

A temporary injunction, at the in stance of a citizen of Salem, has been issued against the location of the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, and the prayer of the plaintiff is to the effect that this injunction be made permanent against locating the institution at any other place than at the "seat of government," as the constitution of the slate provides. If Salem intends to enforce this provision in regard to all public institutions it is time that the balance of Oregon agitated the question of a charge of the state capital. It is not the geographical center, and heavy expenses are incurred every session of the legislature by reason of the distance to this Willamette town. The constitution was adopted when this portion of the northwest had little population, and since that time Eastern Oregon has developed wonderfully. This change in the condition of the country should emphasize the importance of a change in the organic law. Portland is more accessible to all portions of the state, and we have no doubt the business men of the metropolis would be willing to subscribe liberally towards the erection of suitable buildings. The next legislature should pass an act submitting to the electors of this state the question of changing the capital from its present location, and we are satisfied that if the law mentioned Portland or some other convenient city for the "seat of government," it would receive a majority of the votes cast.
