The state grange at its session this morning adopted a resolution in favor silver, and the sentiment of the members is couched in the strongest and most unequivocal language. This resolution not only opposes the repeal of what is known as the Sherman silverpurchasing act "until it is replaced by a law providing for such free and unlimited coinage," but demands that the government use the coms of both metals without discrimination. There can be no objection to the coinage of as many metals as may be convenient for the objects of business; but the government placing its stamp upon eighty cents of silver and making it a legal tender for a dollar is unjust, and works great hardship in the fluctuation of values. 
