"A canal and locks at Celilo might e and would be preferable to a boatrailway or portage but the consummation of the plans in that direction, now Staats, R J pnear too remote for us to trifle away me and newspaper space with them The very best that could be offered at Celilo in a canal would be six miles in length. As a good many of us may not live to exceed two or three hundred years, we would much rather have a portage now than even a ship canal after the twentieth century. A boat-railway so far as we can see appears perfectly plausible and would be much quicker completed than a canal. As it would be the property of the government the cost of operating would not fall as a burden upon any of the localities that hope to reap so much benefit by it. Even in case the boat-railway is not with in our reach a portage ought to be secured without delay. Thus the upper country would he enabled to reach a market at rates much lower than any attained so far.

Improvements Abandoned. Work on the improvement of Snake river, between Huntington and the Seven Devils country, was suspended last fall, and the only steamboat on that stretch of river has since been brought down through the great canyon of the Snake and can never be taken back.
