The report shows that a comparatively small appropriation is required to protect from possible destruction. a government work that has already cost more than \$3,000,-000. It shows, further, that certain work is necessary to be performed be fore the locks can be operated with safety, and the product of hundreds of thousands of people can be transported over the natural outlet from the Inland Empire to market.

Our representatives in congress have had almost a year's notice that an appropriation would be necessary to complete this great work. They have had almost a year's notice that one of the most expensive internal improvements in the United States was subject to serious damage and possible destruction, by high water, that is liable to come any season, for want of a few hundred thousand dollars to protect it They have had almost a year's notice that the key which was to unlock the great waterway of the northwest would remain in the pockets of the govern ment engineers indefinitely, unless an appropriation for completing the walls between the first and second locks were available.

With all this notice, with all this time to reflect, what have our representatives in congress been doing, that it should be necessary to call their attention to their duty by a memorial? Have Senstor Mitchell and Representatives Ellis and Hermann been so busy in their efforts to debase our currency that they have had no time to devote to the needs of this great internal improvement? 
