

It is impossible to distinguish whether the invaders are supported by any substantial portion of the Greek regular army, but the correspondent of the Associated Press is informed the moment the Turkish officers ascertain the presence of uniforms of Greek regulars in the ranks of the aggressors, Edhem Pasha will order an advance of the entire Turkish army. Baker's Sheep Bill. GOLDENDALE, Wash., April 9 .- Representative Herbert Baker's "sheep bill," recently passed by the Washington legislature, was declared in force today by the county board. Quarrantine has been placed on all counties in Oregon opposite Klickitat county. The result will be that 75,000 Oregon sheep will be deprived of regular summer range in and about Mount Adams.
