

DIET AS A MORAL AGENT. Experiment Introduced in a New York Reformatory.

A queer food experiment is being ried at the Elmira reformatory, in New York state, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. All civilized nations hold out some inducement to the criminal in confinement to sooner secure his release from legal restraint. A certain amount f time is always taken off for good behavior. The criminal has often been exhorted to this end by father, mother, prother, sister and by others who had his interest at heart. His manhood, his future, his ambition and his hope of mick release from confinement have been appealed to, and in many cases in vain. Now it is to the man's stomach

that the appeal is to be made. The proposed experiment contemplates a somewhat enlarged scale of dietary privileges, increasing from grade to grade, from lowest to highest, so that within due and proper limits of indulgence of the appetite by prisoners in a prison reformatory for crime they an out of their own accumulations have the privilege to select meal by meal at their pleasure, provided always that M. Delayannis, who recently retired | they keep their expenditure within the imits of indulgence allowed by the government of the reformatory. The prisoners, under the wage-earning system of the reformatory, as it is at present, must earn their living and keep a credit balance to their account, re pectively, in order to progress toward their release by parole. A prisoner, to maintain a credit balance must needs restrain, regulate and exert himself in manner which accomplishes and shows his improvement; but hitherto the diet rate has been inflexible. It is believed that if more latitude is allowed and the prisoner has a chance of tickling his palate occasionally with mince words, 'f he has an inviting menu to choose from for breakfast, dinner and supper, he will get up and hustle and be a man.

HOW HIGH CAN MAN GO?

Human Feet Will Probably Never Press Prof. Ugolino Mosso, of Turin, has made some interesting experiments on the effects experienced in ascending to high altitudes. All climbers of lofty mountains are aware that at great beights, such as the summit of Mont Blanc, respiration becomes more or less roublesome, the heart beats rapidly and sometimes irregularly, and a feeling of exhaustion, often accompanied by nausea, is experienced. These effects arise largely from the rarity of the air, and since the atmosphere becomes less dense the higher one goes, it is evident that a limit must soon be reached above which man cannot ascend. Prof. Mosso made his first experiments on Monte Rosa, next to Mont Blanc, the highest peak of the Alps, where he ascended to an elevation exceeding 15,000 feet without serious inconvenience. Returning to Turin he made his next ascent, so to speak, without ascending at all. In ther words, he produced an imitation of the rare atmosphere of a very lofty nountain top by partially exhausting the air from a large pneumatic chamber in which he had shut himself. When the air in the chamber corresponded in density with that which would be found at a height of 24,272 feet above sea level, he suffered such ill effects that he could not carry the experiment further.
