



SOUVENIR COINS.

So Premium on Columbian Half Dollars

Three years ago everybody wanted i olumbian half dollar and an Isabella quarter, and wanted it bad. If anyody who wanted either of the world's fair souvenirs bad enough to pay over a dollar for it, he could generally get it without much trouble. Sentiment. however, is just about as liable to slump as the wheat market, and anyone who has the hard money silver mementoes of the fair to-day could probably be per suaded to part with a Columbian half lollar for about 51 cents, and hand over a quarter of a dollar. The coins never enjoyed the popularity that was expected. Two million five hundred thousand of the Columbian half dollars were coined, and 40,000 Isabella quarters Four hundred thousand of the half doifor and about 6,000 of the quarters are still in the subtreasury of the United State right in Chicago in the Rand-Me Nally building. About a year and a half ago a rule was made by the treasury de partment that these half dollars could evenly exchanged for gold. The world's fair souvenir sentiment was not quite dead yet, and there was enough of It alive to send \$200,000 in cold hugging out \$200,000 in Columbian halves, or 400,000 of the coins. At that time there was about 800,000 of the halves in the subtreasury. About half of this amount was left after the first rush was made to exchange gold for the halves on even terms. Almost this entire half still repears to be no wild desire on the part of lders of gold to exchange any of it for

Assistant Subtreasurer J. C. Pratt said that in all probability the treasury department would some day give out the Columbian silver money as ordinary

currency. A most interesting regulation exists regarding the disposition of the Isabella quarters. As only 40,000 of the quarters were ever coined they are, of course rare, and far more scarce than the halves. According to a rule of the treasury these quarters are only paid out on drafts of world's fair officials. A seventh pig of the same litter has seven feet, but it did not live. Of course, many have been taken out of the treasury under this regulation, and the \$1,200 or \$1,500 remaining in the vaults of the subtreasury will probably be exhausted before very long by world's fair drafts. Mr. Pratt said that so far not now prized very highly by the holders of them, with whom he had come in contact in an official way, as he says they come in quite often to the treasury in ordinary business transactions, just as does the common-place currency Crooked Creek church, near Marion, without any attention being paid to Ky., who rode horseback to worship one their souvenir qualities by the man night, and when service was over they passing them in. Since the quarters are not so plentiful, they are naturally valued a little more highly, and are seldom, if ever, seen in the currency handled in business transactions,-Chicago Inter Ocean.
