It provides that all immigrants physi ally capable, and over 16 years of age, hall be able to read or write the Engish language or some other language; but a person not able to read or write, who is over fifty years of age. and is the parent or randparent of a qualified immigrant over 21 years of age, capable of supporting such a parent or grandparent, may accompany the immigrant, or the parent or grandparent may be sent for, and come to join the family of the child, or grandchild over 21 years of age who is qualified under the law, and the wife of minor child not able to read or write may accompany or be sent for reasurer and Lash should not have and come and join the husband or parent who is qualified.

A very strong solution of lime, sulphur and salt can be applied now, before the huds begin to swell, without injury to the trees, but that is sufficiently strong to destro the scale, would prove very injurious to the foliage and fruit. 
