Anderson's orders instructed him to meet a local freight at Naples and wait for that train to take the siding. When the point was reached Anderson gave no indication of stopping his engine, and as the train dashed by the switch the fireman saw his engineer sitting as if in a trance.

At the same moment he saw the local coming down upon them. A collision was inevitable and the fireman sprang isfactory to me. It was not nearly for the footboard, crying to the engineer to jump.

Anderson looked at the fireman in a dazed manner, but made no movement toward the cab entrance. The fireman sprang out and the trains rushed to gether. Anderson was caught beneath his engine just as he had dreamed he would be and the steam enveloped him. He was finally taken from his awful position, but he had received injuries from which he soon died. Every other man on the train escaped .- St. Louis Re-


