One who is conversant with the subject, says from \$1500 to \$2000 a month are sent out of The Dalles for beer alone. Say it is \$1500 a month, this means \$18,000 a year. All this could be kept at home if the people would but content themselves with the domestic product of the Columbia brewery, which is as palatable and wholesome beer as is made any place in the world. If the liquor dealers of the city would but form a combination and agree to keep one but Columbia beer on draught, it would be but a short time until none would be imported. As a result \$18,000 a year would be retained

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
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
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
