from Madrid says all Spain knows of Cervera's defeat, and the people are begining to realize the magnitude of the disaster. The conservative press exhorts good citizens to maintain peace. An important circular has been sent to all republican organization signed by the learders, bearing

How He Surrendered. Following is Leiutenant Hobson's account of the darring deed he per ormed at the enterance of Santiago

"I did not miss the entrance to the harbor," he said "as Ensign Powell, in the launch, supposed. I headed east until I got my bearings, and then made for it, straight in. Then came the firing. It was grand, flashing out from one side, then the other, from those big guns on the hills, the Vizcaya'

lying inside the barbor, joining in. "Troops from Santiago had rushed lown when the news of the Merrimac' coming was telegraphed, and soldiers lined the foot of the cliffs, firing wildly across and killing each other with

their crossfire. "The Merrimac's steering gear broke as she got to Estrella point. Only three of the torpedoes on her side exploded when I touched the bottom. A hugh submarine mine caught her full amidships, and hurling water high in the air and tearing a great rent in the Merrimac's side. Her stern ran up on Estrella point.

"Chiefly owing to the work done by the mine, she began to sink slowly At that time she was across the channel, before she settled the tide drifted her around.

"We were all aft, lying on the deck. Shells and bullets whietled around us. The six-inch shells from the Vizcaya came tearing into the Merrimac, crashing into wood and iron and passing clear through, while the pludging shots from the forts broke through

say, 'Hadn't we better drop off now, sir?'. But I said, 'Wait till daylight.' It would have been impossible to get the catamaran any where but to the shore, where the soldiers stood shooting and I hoped that by daylight we might

be recognized and saved.

"The grand old Merrimac kept sinking. I wanted to go forward and see the damage done there, where nearly all the fire was directed, but one man said that if I rose it would draw the fire on the rest; so I lay motionless. It was splendid the way those men behaved. The fire of the soldiers, the batteries and the Vizcaya was awful. "When the water came up on the Merrimac's decks the catamaran floated amid the wreckage, but was still made fast to the boom, and we caught

hold of the edge and clung on, our heads being above water. "One man thoguht we were safer right there; it was quite light, the firing had ceased, except that on the New York's launch, and I feared En-

sign Powell and his men had been Merrimac. We agreed to capture her and run. Just as she came close, the Spaniards saw us, and half a dozen marines jumped up and pointed their

rifles at our heads. " 'Is there any officer in that boat to receive a surrender of prisoners of war?" I shouted. An old man leaned over under the awning and waved his hand. It was Admiral Cervera. The marines that a hospital train bearing the lowered their rifles, and we were help-

ed into the launch. "Then we were put in cells in Morro castle. Afterwards we were taken into Santiago. I had the court-martial room in the barracks. My men were kept prisoners in the hospital."


