Death has again called from The Dalles one who was generally loved, one whose place cannot be readily filled. Mrs. Grace Condon, wife of J. W. Condon, died very suddenly at her nome on Union street about 4:30 Sunday morning. She had been ill since Wednesday of last week with tonsilitis, but on Saturday was thought Dr. Gertrude French, was summone from Portland arriving here on the 11 o'clock train, and with Mr. Condon watched over the sufferer during the night. Shortly before 4 o'clock they discovered symptoms of her growing worse, and summoned her parents and the physician, but they arrived only to see her breathe her last.
