England Agrees to Abrogate the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 .- A special to the Herald from Washington says: All danger of further friction between the United States and Great Britain over the construction of the Nicaragua canal will shortly be removed by the abrogation of the Clayton-Balwer treaty. Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British ambassador, has received or will receive within the next few days positive instructions to enter apon negotiations with Secretary Hay for the abrogation of the convention referred to, and the preparation of a new treaty guaranteeing the neutral-

ity of the canal. The change in the attitude of the British government from its old position of insisting upon having a voice in the construction of the proposed canal in the result of representations made to Lord Salisbury by Mr. Henry White, charge d'affaires of this government in London. It is the understanding of those who are aware of the change in the attitude of the British government that Lord Salisbury will suggest through Sir Julian the advisability of the United States granting some [concessions to his government in the return for the relinguishment of the important rights possessed by Great Britain in the matter of a canal across the isthumus which for nearly 50 years have been recognized by this government in the treaty negotiated by John M. Clayton, on the part of the United States, and Lord Henry Lytton-Bulwer, on the part of the British government.
