BACK FROM THE YOKON. aptain Waud Arrives In the City Last Night From the Frozen North-

What He Has to Say About That Country. The family and friends of Captain Waud were pleasantly surprised last evening by the receipt of a telegram stating that he was in Portland and would arrive home on the 11:30 train. In a conversation with the captain

ne stated that his boat is at present laid up on account of the ice, which enabled him to make this visit to his family and Dalles friends. When he left for home the river

steamer, on which he is captain, was hemmed in by four feet of ice, and it is his opinion that its depth has increased foot or so since that time.

He is running on the Yukon from Dawson to White Horse rapids, a disance of over 400 miles. It usually takes ten days to make the round trip. It is necessary to have double crews for each boat as they run night and day. One of the most hazardous places on the trip is what is known as Thirty mile river, it takes over 9 hours to go up the thirty miles. while the re-




