TO INVESTIGATE

GENERAL MILES

A Court Of Inquiry Will Be Ordered.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.-Indications are that a court of inquiry will be ordered to investigate and report upon the truth or falsity of statements alleged to have been made by General Miles, in which the quality of beef furnished the troops during the late war was brought in question.

The matter was discussed at son length at today's cabinet meeting, and although no definite decision was reached, the concensus of opinion was that such proceedings should be had. It was argued that if packers who had furnished beef to the army had fraudulently supplied the article as charged by Miles, the country had a right to know that fact. It was also agreed that Miles should not be suspende from office as commander of the army pending such investigation.

It is not believed any action will b taken, however, until the war investigating committee has made its report, which is expected next Monday. No one outside of the commission is sup posed to know what the nature of the report will be. The method which is to be adopted, namely, a court of inquiry to pass upon Miles' conduct, is taken to indicate a knowledge on the part of the administration of what the report will have to say as bearing upon Miles' charges.

The common impression is that the ourt of inquiry can be ordered only apon demand of the officer whose conduct is to be made the subject of investigation. While that is usually the case, there is, however, a reserve power in the president to order such a court, regardless of the wishes of the officer concerned. The authority is contained in article 115 of the ar-

Steps will be taken by the Spaniards o put their views before the American administration, as they believe if an ndependent government is contemplated in the near future, the trade of the island will be brought to an immediate standstill. In any case they think the United States should retain control for a considerable period.

Filipinos Were Worsted

on Every Side.

MANILA, Feb. 6.-A sanguinary en ounter between American troops and surgents has occurred. The clash came at 8:40 vesterday evening, when three daring Filipinos darted past the Nebraska regiments at Santa Mesa, but retired when chalguarantee for over fifty years. lenged. They repeated the experi-

> ment without drawing the sentries fire, but at the third time Corpora Greeley challenged the Filipinos and then fired, killing one of them and wounding another. Almost immedlately afterwards the Filipinos' line from Calocan to Santa Mesa commenc ed a fusillade which was ineffectual. The Nebraska, Montana and North Dakota outposts replied vigorously, and held their ground until reinforce

ments arrived. The Filipnos in the meantime concentrated at three points, Calocan Gagalangin and Santa Mesa. At about I o'clock the Filipinos opened a hot fire from all three places simultaneously. This was supplemented by the fire of the two siege guns at Bahk-Balik and by advancing their kirmishers from Paco and Pandacan. The Americans responded with a eriffic fire, but owing to the darkness they were unable to determine its

The Utah light artillery finally succeeded in silenceing the native battery. The Third artillery also did good work on the extreme left. The engagement lasted over an hour. The United States cruiser Charleston and the gunboat Concord, stationed off

Malahon, opened fire from their secondary batteries on the Filipinos' position at Calocan and kept it up At 2:45 there was another fusillade along the entire line and the United States sea going double turreted

monitor Monadnock opened fire on vanced. The California and Washington regiments made a splendid charge and drove the Filipinos from the works at Paco and Santa Mesa. The Nebraska regiment also distinguished itself, capturing several prisoners and one Howitzer, and a very strong position at the reservoir, which is connected with the water

The Kausas and Dakota regiments compelled the enemy's right flank to The Dalles, Portland and Astoria retire to Calocan. There was intermittentent firing at various points all day long. The losses of the Filipinos can not be eltimated at present but they are
