The New York Tribune is of the opinion that there will be no marked rise in the price of wheat, owing to the large quantities that were bought by a great combination of speculators, months ago when there were reports that the winter wheat had been seriously damaged. The mistake was made by speculative falsehoods and the discrediting of truthful statement in regard to the quality of wheat remaining from last year.

We are pleased to see that the petition which was circulated by Dr. W. Moore, asking the County court to open a road from this valley to the Pine Creek mines was signed by several hundred tax payers of the county, all of whom are willing to fit financially in the venture. The court can do nothing less than act, and should do so without loss of time. The people we believe are fully awake to the necessity of the road and will contribute liberally toward building it.

The Portland Standard, leading democratic paper of the State, is not in favor of calling an extra session of the legislature, for the purpose of electing a Senator, but thinks if the Governor should call an extra session, the democratic numbers should attend and try by every means in their power to elect a democrat. It says that there are many indications that the choice of such a Senator would be acceptable to many republicans. This is taking a hopeful view of the matter, we say the least.

It is sometimes hard to tell how a case will terminate when it once gets into the courts. The celebrated case of R. C. Sajete vs. James A. Wilson, which was decided a short time ago in the Circuit court—the court decreeing a forfeiture of the principal of the debt claimed by Sajete, to the State, under the usury law, and rendering judgment against Sajete for costs of suit, has been appealed to the Supreme court, by the attorneys for Sajete, who are confident that the decision will be reversed. Probably this extended contest will be decided in the course of time.

The city council may recently passed some very stringent laws relative to fast riding, games of chance, etc., while to suppress, it will be necessary for the marshal to make arrests for minor offenses. It is the intention of the council to see that these laws are enforced. It is probably all right, but if they are to be such laws have been heretofore, simply made for style, they should never have been enacted. A law that is systematically disregarded and that cannot be put in effect, only serves to bring into contempt our judicial system, and the officials whose duty it is to see that the laws are observed.

The Northwest is undoubtedly rich in many other things besides gold and silver. Mines of coal, copper, marble, etc., have been discovered, and now comes the news that a discovery has been made in Puyallup valley, W. T., about fifteen miles east of Tacoma, which promises to revolutionize the oil trade. Experts from Pennsylvania have arrived on the ground and pronounce the indications as the best they ever saw. The oil so far found is known as "amber," and burns in a lamp readily without being refined. It is of the highest known grade. It is anticipated that the wells will consume thirty days in sinking the well 1,500 feet. There is already considerable excitement over the affair in Tacoma, and oil prospectors are out in every direction. Verify our country is developing fast.
