While W. W. Cole's circus was coming through the tunnel near Cairo on the way to that city, three cages struck the roof of the tunnel and were completely demolished.

A Tekonsha, Mich., dispatch states that a fire in the interior of J. C. Faling's residence burned the father and mother and two sleeping children so severely that one of the children died and the parents are not expected to live.

A paragraph has been lately published in leading papers of the country stating that Denver, Colorado, had been "stricken with sudden paralysis; business stagnant, residences and business houses tenanted by the hundred, with vast amounts of money invested in them worse than sunk."

A riot occurred at Londonderry on the 21st. owing to ill feeling between the citizens and troops. A party of forty soldiers had a scuffle with the civilians and overpowered them.

Herr Windhorst, leader of the German clerical party, will take an active part in the meeting of the German Catholics to be held in Munster, Prussia, next month.

The recent order of the commissioner of internal revenue for the release of spirits shipped from Peoria to Philadelphia, and then seized for re-examination, applied also to spirits from the same city seized in New York and Baltimore, where similar examinations were made.

A BIG ROLL FOR SOMEBODY.

Looking After An Estate Said to be Valued at \$500,000,000.

Dayton (O.) dispatch: For the last several days meetings of several persons from various sections in this state, and from Pennsylvania, Indiana, Wisconsin and New York, have been held in this city.

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THE SOUTHERN WONDER-LAND.
