

McCullough in a Mad-House.

Poor John McCullough, the tragedian, in a mad-house, is a fru trul theme. A man who has received the plaudits of millions of his countrymen moving on toward imbecility in the very prime of life should be a warning to those who attempt to overwork the brain and keep up the convivualities of life at the same time. McCullough's greatest role was the Roman father, Virginius. With what tenderness, pathos and horrible reality he drew his beautiful stage daughter "to the racking shambles" and saved her life by ending it. None can forget the wonderful power with which he portraved Virginius, after reason had fled and how pitifully he calls the fair Virginia to his side when his own hand had placed her beyond the reach of harm. McCullough was always great in the heroic drama. He had the

voice, presence and splendid physique -all the requisites for a good actoradded to a fine memory. keen percep-tion and indomitable will. Good company was his bane. He had pernaps more wealthy friends and big "spenders" of money who liked him than any other actor in America. They loved to be in his company and he was always at his best when in theirs.

"A few years ago," said a friend, "I was at a banquet at Willard's notel, in Washington tendered to McCullough. He was about ending a successful two weeks engagement in that city. It was on Saturday night and along towsrd midnight, after he had met his death at the hands of Rich-mond on the battle-field of Bosworth at the theater, he appeared at the banquet table and was greeted by a brilliant array of congressmen, statesmen, army and navy officers and journalists. Justice Miller, of the Supreme Court of the United States, presided. Blaine was there and General Sherman, and his brother John, the senator, Joe Blackburn and scores of other noted men. 'I knew a clever fellow from Maine who graduated from my state as a Yankee school-teacher, who I fear will never be president,' was among the thrusts that Blackburn launched. It was also some years previous to the statement made by Neal Dow that Blaine had always been a teetotaller, though I do not mean to insinuate that the man from Maine was 'lushy' in the least on that occasion. 

ALMOND MILK .-- Almond milk has been found quite useful in cases of fever, and when very light nourishing drinks were wanted.
