

The Chinese.

The recent developments in the Chinese quarters in San Francisco, and other Chinese atrocities and practices which have been brought to light, are not likely to throw a very formidable safeguard around the moon-eyed mongolians, on the Pacific coast. The tremor of ill feeling against the Chinamen has been felt considerably of late, and occasionally relieves its pent up feelings with such outrages as have been witnessed in Wyoming and other places. It is not all unlikely that the match of the incendiary will again be resorted to, as was five or six years ago, in California. The quietly growing antipathy against the "heathen Chinese" will sooner or later burst out with fever heat, and millions of dollars worth of property will be destroyed before quiet can again be restored. We are not in favor of the Chinese element in our country, and would like to know that our country was free from their contaminating influences; but we are not in favor, nor will we sanction any unlawful measures or mob law, for the purpose of driving the Chinese out of the country, so long as our government says by its acts and treaties that they must be protected. What the best method is for ridding the country of them, is a very delicate question, but certainly brutal outrages against them is not likely to have the desired effect, and may involve the government in a difficulty from which she may not easily rid herself. We believe there will be a legitimate method yet conceived by which she may put an almost eternal barrier between the United States and the Chinamen; but until then we had better wait.

The New Nation.

Evidences are daily multiplying that the bitterness and hatred of war is lying out in all parts of the country except among a few of the bourbon leaders of the republican party. With all practical men, who cannot afford to have their hearts gangrened with hate, there is growing up between the north and south such a feeling of friendship as has never been known since the dispute concerning slavery began. General Grant had the disapproval to see before his death that we were upon the eve of a new era, and the manifestations of feeling evoked by his death have been followed by the expressions of a sound and sober thought different and more stable than that which might be evoked by a momentary emotion.

The New England veterans, while visiting the scenes of their warfare in the valley of the Shenandoah, were met at Harrisburg by confederate veterans, by the citizens of the town and by several detachments of Virginia citizen-soldiers. There were dinners and speeches and lunches; and finally the northern veterans marched to the cemetery and decorated the graves of the confederate dead. In such courtesies no one, either visitor or host, waived any principle, since all principles at issue between the two sections were finally settled and conclusively twenty years ago. But the salutary influence of the good understanding there established was not for a day, nor a year, nor a century. Senator Sherman's note of national discord comes too late. Neither in Ohio nor anywhere else can the republican party be rallied by sounding the recall. The questions of the living present are to be settled by this generation. The memories of the past belong to history.

The negroes of Virginia have also caught the wave of feeling that is sweeping the country, and refuse to be longer used by selfish republicans for the purpose of arresting the new movement to enable them to get back into office. [Standard.]

The unexpected rise in wheat will make our farmers feel as if a cyclone of sudden affluence had struck square amidship. How long it will continue is hard to tell, but from the present indications, decline will not follow very closely upon the heels of the advance. We believe now that farmers have every reason to expect a good price for their grain. Just what the cause for advances is, is equally difficult of solution, but the wave has struck us with sufficient force to cause a thrill of better prices. Complications in European affairs may and likely have been a partial cause.

Reduction Works at Portland.

We learn from a gentleman, just up from Portland, that undoubtedly this coming summer, reduction works will be built in Portland. This is a good move on the part of Portlanders, and no doubt would prove a very profitable investment. With the developments of new ledges in almost every part of the State we know of no other place so conveniently situated. The coming season, thousands of tons of ore will be shipped to Omana, San Francisco, and other points, unless reduction works are built at some more accessible point. Railroads center from all parts of the State, and Washington territory at her threshold, making the transportation short and of less expense than to the two former places.
