#### It Results in a Terrific Collision Between Two New Jersey Trains.

#### The Enginds Completely Wrecked and Nearly a Dozen Persons Killed.

The Train Dispatcher Under Arrest.

Jersey City (N. J.) dispatch of the 18th: On the Meadows, four miles west of this city, a collision occurred between two trains, this evening, which resulted in the death of nine pe sons and the injury of several others. The Pacific express, leaving here at 8:15 o'clock, ran into the western-bound emigrant train, which had stopped at a coal chute, on the east side of Hackensack bridge, knocking a portion of the latter across the track of the Lehigh Valley road. Shortly afterward a Lehigh Valley train, eastward bound, came thundering along and crashed into the wreck. The dead were all on the emigrant train, as were also the injured. The brakeman of the latter train was among the victims. The wreck was the most frightful one which has occurred on the road for years. Following is a full list of the dead and

wounded as far as known: Killed-Karl Henry Grommer, aged 30 years, Norwegian; hend taken off; had three tickets from New York to Battle Creek, Mich., and papers showing that he arrived by the steamship Elbe. An unknown boy, aged 8 years, horribly

crushed An unknown woman, head off.

Enlina Arneares, aged 20, who was on her way to Madison, Wis., whereher father resides, died at the St. Francis hospital. Four more bodies were found this morning under the wreck of the Lehigh Valley locomotive; they have not been identified. Two unknown boys were found under the pilot of the engine, one 8 years and the

An unknown woman, head and arms gone; remains badly seorched. An unknown man, trunk burned to a crisp, was found five feet below the surface of the wreck.

Thomas R. Pratt, telegraph operator, has been arrested. Pratt is 26 years old is an experienced operator. He admits is an experienced operator. He admits that he did not give the right signals, and says he was advised by friends to desert, but refused to do so. He is held to await the action of the coroner's jury. He resides in this city with his wife and three

Of the three bodies discovered buried in front of the Lehigh Valley engine, one was that of a woman unknown and unrecogniz-

LATER.-Pratt, the telegraph operator, was arraigned this afternoon on the charge of manslaughter. He waived examination and was held to await theaction of the coroner's jury. Norman L. Rowe, counsel for Pratt, makes the following statement: "Pratt was stationed in the Marion signal tower, near the station of that name. controlled the east end of a section of the rond known as a block, extending from Marion to the Fish house, on the Hackensuck meadows, about three miles distant. It was his duty to record the passage of trains, and their passing the Fish house, upon the tally sheet which lay before him. The emigrant train had passed his station thirteen minutes before the Western express approached. Pratt glanced at his sheet, and mistook another entry for the record of the emigrant train, having passed the Fish house. The emigrant train had not left the block, however, having backed down to pick up two cars which had broken loose

In his statement to Chief of Police Murbecause of the thirteen minutes which

had elapsed. Supt. Crawford states that the investigation shows that Pratt alone is responsible. The white signal, denoting a clear track, was shown, and justified the engineer of the

express in running in upon the block.

The wrecked Lehigh Valley engine was raised this evening. In the mud beneath was found the body of a boy 10 years of age. He had light hair. Both legs were off below the knee, the right side of his face was crushed and his hands scorched. Beside the body was found the leg of a boy who was presumably 12 years of age. The member does not correspond with the remaining portions of any of the bodies in the morgue. It is thought an-other life has been lost. This makes a total of nine deaths. The debris is being earefully searched.

## MRS. NELLIE GRANT SARTORIS.

#### A Report that She Has Separated from Her Husband.

Washington dispatch: The recently published reports of the permanent separation of Mrs. Nellie Grant Sartoris from her husband caused Washington people to remember how much astonished and disgusted they felt over the match. The impression Sartoris made in Washington was that of a rough, coarse-brained, and decidedly vulgar, low-bred Englishman. His general coarse conduct in connection with the fact that he had exhibited some of Miss Nellie's letters to him, accompanied with gross remarks, to persons in a Wisconsin town where an accomplished young lady had rejected his addresses, caused solicitude among many of Gen. Grant's warm personal friends, and some of them consulted as to the propriety of informing him of Sartoris' conduct, with a view of regaining pos-session of Miss Nellie's letters. Senator Matt Carpenter finally consented to broach the delicate subject to General Grant. He called at the white house, and in as delicate a manner as possible commenced relating the current scandal as to Sartoris' notorious conduct, when the general quietly re-marked: "That will do, Mr. Senator; but my dau, hter is engaged to Mr. Sartoris, and the wedding will take place." Senator Carpenter, in speaking of the interview, said he never felt so chagrined as at the president's abrupt closing of the conversation, and that he would never again, under any circumstances, attempt to advise about the domestic affairs of any one. It was well known that Gen. Grant was op-posed to the alliance, but when his daughter's affections were engaged he acquiesced and would listen to no argument or suggesand would laten to no argument or sugges-tion to the contrary. When Gow Jewell was returning from his mission at St. Petersburg to accept a position in Grant's cabinet he stopped a day at Southampton to call upon the elder Mr. and Mrs. Sar-toris, the parents of Miss Nellie's husband. He was cordially received by them, but in the course of conversation Mrs. Sartoris astonished the ex-minister to Russia by remarking that "she did not see what there was about Algernon (her son) to couse the daughter of the president of the great United States to fall in love with and marry."
Gov. Jewell subsequently expressed the same astonishment.

## An Excursion Ends in Riot.

A crowd of 20,000 people, among whem was a large number of roughs, gathered on the wharf at Pittsburg to join an excursion to Davis island dam, where Capt. Paul

Boynton was to give an exhibition. The ofcers of the steamer were overpowered, and their boat loaded to the water's edge. On this account they were unable to make the trip, and announced that the exhibition

would be given before the wharf. This led to a riot, during which roughs with axes and other implements almost cut up the excursion barges Edna and Alice, and compelled the officers to jump into the river to save their lives, betause they would not refund the money taken for tickets. A large force of policemen were ordered to the wharf, but order was not restored for a long time. The ringleaders were arrested.

### TRAGEDY IN AN IOWA COUNTY.

A Fiend Blows His Brother's Brains Out With an Old Musket.

Sioux City dispatch: The most horrible murder that every disgraced Woodbury county occurred in Westfork township last evening. James and John Johnson, brothers, lived together on a farm. John was married and James a single man, about 28 years of age. Yesterday they had a house raising, after which a keg of beer was tapped. The two brothers quarreled and James was ordered from the house. went out on the prairie and remained until about 11 o'clock. He then returned to the house and found his brother asleep in bed. Taking an old army musket, he loaded it, placed the muzzle to John Johnson's head and blew his brains out. Not satisfied with his fiendish work, he deliberately loaded the gun again and fired another charge into his head, scattering his brains and blood over the bed and walls of room. The murderer remained at the louse two hours and then went and informed the neighbors that his brother was dead. He was immediately placed under arrest and subsequently made a confession of the horrible crime. On the way to this city with an officer they met a wagon with a coffin for the dead man, and Johnson being told he would never see his brother ngain, replied: "Yes, I will; I will meet him in hell." ## PRESIDENT ADAMS SPEAKS OUT.

He Denounces the Southern Pacific's Last Move as Grasping.

A story comes from New York, says a Boston dispatch, that the Transcontinental association hassent notice to the Paci fic Mail company that at the expiration of thirty days its monthly subsidy payment will be stopped. President Adams, of the Union Pacific, said that he had no information concerning it, but intended to make inquiries regarding it. The policy of the Southern Pacific on transcontinental business has been, he thought, very arbitrary and he was disposed to condemn in the strongest manner possible their recent ac-tion in relusing to honor a draft sent to them. The Union Pacific was not at all solicitous about transcontinental business, and could do without the agreement much better than the Southern Pacific, which in dicated a desire to have things all its own way, and justified every line in withdraw ing from the association. Concerning his visit to Wasington, President Adams said he had talked the whole Pacific mail sub-ject with the United States railroad commissioner and Assistant Secretary Jenks Both gentlemen understood the question thoroughly and the latter denied emphatically that he intended to pursue the course attributed to him by some of the newspapers.

# A Free Trade Scheme in Mexico.

A City of Mexico dispatch says the cabireform measures give rise to many rumors. A recent editorial in the Boston Herald creates much comment. It hints that a loan to Mexico might be raised in the United States. A scheme for free trade between the two republics, the United States to pay Mexico \$15,000,000 annually, is being talked up. Among the Americans the plan is thought to be wise, as it would lead to a great increase in trade, opening up the entire Mexican market to American manufacturers and bringing the two countries into very intimate and friendly relations. The Mexican editors who recently traveled in the United States believe in a close commercial connection with that city.

# To Shut Out Pleuro-Pneumonia.

Governor Oglesby, of Illinois, has issued a proclamation of quarantine against pleuro-pneumonia and prohibiting the ship ment of cattle from the following named localities: Counties-Richmond, Kings and Queens in the state of New York; Bergen, Queens in the state of New York; Bergen, Passaic, Essex, Union, Hunterdon, Camden, Burlington, Hudson and Middlesex in New Jersey; Baltimore and Prince George in Maryland; Fairfax and Londsun, in Virginia; Harrison and Pendleton in Kentucky; Newcastle in Delaware; Jefferson in West Virginia, and the District of Columbia. The proclamation was made upon the recommendation of the live stock commission. recommendation of the live stock commis-sion of Illinois, which reported information that pleuro-pneumonia existed among cattle in the counties above named.



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


