The East Portland *Vindicator* whines like a galled horse, and kicks back vehemently at our criticism on the conduct of some of the newspapers toward the *Oregonian*, in the late unpleasantness. We spoke but the sentiment of every man in Oregon who is honest with himself. The editor of the *Vindicator* has taken the criticism to heart, and as it is very applicable to him, he is welcome to it. He says that a man is a fool who will not fall in with the majority. We suppose if he was among a gang of thieves he would be impelled to be as great a thief as any of them. He is evidently one of those weaklings whom a "great man" has only to put on the head, to gain his lifelong devotion. This is evidenced by his description of his interview with Mitchell, who was over in East Portland a few days ago. The SENATOR grasped him by the hand, which set his inimitable gizzard all a flutter; then the Senator thanked him for his services, and he began to imagine himself as big as Goliath; then the Senator smiled and withdrew. The editor of the *Vindicator* is now a Mitchell man, and he don't care a tuck who knows it. Bah! this is one of the phases of human nature we alluded to. To some people it is amusing. It always acts on us as a cathartic.

Vice-President Hendricks.

The newspapers throughout the country unanimously pay tribute to the sterling worth and noble character of the late Vice-President Hendricks. It has been the custom with average newspaper men, upon the death of any prominent official, to break forth into the most fulsome strains of flattery, and by lauding the imaginary virtues of the deceased; work themselves into the belief that a great man had departed, and, as friends; lie about his virtues; after he is dead, more outrageously than his enemies ever lied about his character while he lived. This has been carried to such an extent that very little attention is paid to newspaper eulogies; and as a general thing, they are taken for what they are worth. In this instance; however, we can conscientiously join in the tribute of respect paid by our brethren of the press to the illustrious dead, not because it is necessary, for it certainly is not. Only by a man's acts can he be judged; and if they have been honest and upright, such as to endear him to the hearts of his countrymen, his memory needs not the fulsome flattery and praise of those who stand ever ready to fawn upon those above them in rank, and it, on the contrary, his actions will not bear investigation, despite all the eulogies that may be showered upon him he fades into obscurity where he properly belongs. Mr. Hendricks needs not the praise of any man to raise him to the estimation of the people. His record while in life is his own best eulogy. May he rest in peace.

Foreign Immigration.

The *Press* suggests that the discussion of the Chinese question; which the United Pacific coast delegation will press upon Congress, be accompanied by an inquiry regarding the desirability of the United States defining its present liberal policy towards immigrants of all nations. It is stated that 20,000,000 of acres of public lands available for settlement remain undisposed of in Dakota. In four or five years this remnant will be absorbed. While there are claimed to be special objections against Chinese immigrants which do not weigh against those of other nationalities, it will be well if an effort to exclude the former leads to serious consideration of the whole subject of immigration.
