A RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS IN BOTH BRANCHES OF THE SAME.

SENATE.—The senate was called to order at 12 o'clock on the 7th. After prayer Mr. Edmunds nominated Senator Sherman for president of the senate. Mr. Voorhees moved to substitute the name of Mr. Harris. The yeas and nays were then ordered upon Voorhees' motion and the amendment was lost by a strict party vote, whereupon Sherman was elected without further division. Committee were appointed to notify the president and the house of representatives of the organization of the senate. Upon request of Secretary McCook Sherman was escorted to the chair by Edmunds and Voorhees and took the oath of office, administered by Edmunds. The credentials were read, and Logan and Blair were at once sworn in by the president. Temporary Resolutions on the death of Hendricks were passed, after which "out of respect to the memory of the late vice president" adjourned.

HOUSE.—In the house the chamber presented a pleasant scene, the bright red carpet leading to an air of cheeriness to the hall, which had been thoroughly renovated since last spring, while a number of desks, including that of the speaker, were decorated with flowers. Here and there were groups of members chatting and laughing, political animosities being set aside for the time being, while new members took advantage of the occasion to extend their acquaintance among their older and more experienced colleagues. The chief part of the conversation was the change of rules. The galleries were crowded with the exception of the executive gallery, which was only partially filled. A majority of the speakers were ladies. At noon the house was called to order by J. R. Clark, clerk, and the first session of the Forty-ninth congress began. The election of house officers resulted in the election of those chosen by the democratic caucus. The usual committee was then appointed to join the one from the senate to announce to the president of the organization of the two branches of congress. The president then being ready to present his message, the house, out of respect to the late vice president, adjourned.

Dakota's Wheat Crop. Private telegrams received from James Baynes, statistician of Dakota, give information of his forthcoming report of Dakota's 1885 crop. It will show a surprising amount of wheat gone out of the farmers' hands. From reliable reports thus far received, he asserts that fully two-thirds of the past season's crop has been delivered by the farmers.

Meeting of Stockmen. A call has been issued by the secretary of the International Range Cattle and Horse Growers' association to Mexico, Kansas, Texas, Nebraska, Colorado, Oregon, Nevada, California, Dakota, Montana, Utah, Wyoming, Arizona, Washington, Idaho, British Columbia, New Mexico and Indian Territory, for delegates for the first annual meeting at Denver, Jan. 27th next. The delegates are allowed to be one delegate for every fifty thousand cattle and horses. All rangers are invited whether delegates or not.
