

The Registry Law

Below we give a synopsis of the provisions of the new registry law, and the action to be taken in the matter by the Union county commissioners.

A general election is to be held upon the first Monday in June 1888, and biennially thereafter. The county court will at its session this month appoint judges and clerks of elections for the precincts, whose duty it shall be to meet at their respective polling places on the first Monday in March and sit as a Board of Registration from 9 A. M. until 5 P. M. for 3 days.

To be a legal voter a person must be a male over 21 years of age, either native born or have declared his intentions of becoming a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state for 6 months and of the county 90 days preceding the day of election and of the precinct upon the date of registration. No person is allowed within 100 ft. of the polling place except by request and person of each party may be heard and act as challenger. Tickets must all be printed on paper furnished by the secretary of state.

The county judge and commissioners constitute a Board of Registration to which all contested cases must be appealed, and will meet on the first Monday following the close of registration. They must sit three days but not more than ten days.

In case of special elections registration must be made 30 days before the election. For presidential elections registration is made in the month of August same as provided for the March registration for the state elections. Challenges may be made either against registration or voting for any legal cause, whereupon the person desiring to register or vote may be sworn as to his competence. Any person registering fraudulently may be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100, or imprisoned in the penitentiary one year or both in the discretion of the court.

The above are the principal features of the law and it becomes important that all who desire to participate in the election next June, be careful to attend to their polling places during the first Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of March next, and be sure they are properly registered.

As noted in this paper last week, the Union County Commissioners will not act on this matter this month, but have adjourned until the 9th day of February, when it will be taken up. This is done for the reason that there are several precincts in the county altogether too large for the convenience of voters therein, and the Commissioners will permit a division of the same, if, in the meantime proper petitions are presented, giving the boundaries, etc., of the precincts. Probably if this is done, a much larger vote will be cast at the next June election, than there otherwise would be.

The speech of Senator Beck of Kentucky on silver has restored confidence among the friends of that metal, and demoralized the gold bugs. The Kentuckian quoted the laws relating to silver and the payment of bonds and insisted that it was the duty of Executive officers to enforce them. This has a good effect in the Treasury Department. Secretary Manning has issued a call for 10,000,000 bonds, and says the sinking fund for the current fiscal year will have \$48,000,000 applicable to the redemption of bonds.

We believe it is the duty of a newspaper to give its readers an account of everything in this way of news, coming under its observation, and to do so in truthful and straightforward manner, regardless of what the nature of the subject may be. Whatever is generally known and discussed by the community at large, is certainly matter for newspaper mention and comment, and when we are asked (as we have been this week) to not make public certain affairs, we do so reluctantly, inasmuch as the parties making the request have never in anywise contributed to the support or encouragement of this paper.

A Washington special says: The report from Santa Fe of the arrival there of nineteen prisoners charged with perjury and fraudulently making use of government land, is but the beginning of a prosecution of the frauds upon the land office. It is understood that eighty-five warrants are out for the arrest of persons charged with violating the Homestead and Pre-emption laws, and that these present a very small part of the allegations made against individuals residing in New Mexico and Wyoming.

The residents of Wallowa are discussing the advisability of seceding from Union, and establishing a separate county. Well, as the location of the Wallowa naturally separates it from other portions of the county, and as it has, or will soon have within its borders sufficient population and resources for self support, we do not think it will be an unwise thing to do.

Our contemporary, the Sentinel, has again changed hands. J. B. Fithian retiring, and Mr. Owens, of Umatilla county, assuming charge. We wish the new proprietor success, and deuce in abundance. The Sentinel under the management of Mr. Fithian has been red hot, and has made it extremely warm for its political opponents. We are sorry to see Mr. Fithian take his departure from among us.

It is a most thrilling sight when the editors of two precinct political newspapers, of different proclivities, become imbued with the idea that the destiny of the Republic rests on their efforts alone, and that the other is liable to destroy the government at any time. The "thrill" is experienced by spectators when the said editors commence to carve each other.
