Highways, etc.

Our Baker City friends are trying pretty hard to find a better route to connect with the Pine creek road, than the one leading from that place to Goose ereck, near Hogem, They think they have found a bottor route, by branching off somewhere, and tapping Eagle Vailey , thence up Summit creek to intersect the State road, This is all right on the part of the people of Baker. It is undoubtedly to their interest to get as good a route as possible, but we infer from a letter written by a miner at Coraucopia to the Sage Brush that the foolish ides is entertained by some that the State road can be changed from the Griffith survey :

"Do these meddlers know that the grade on Griffith's survey is a uniform one of mostly less than 10 feat to 100 and in no place over 12 feet. They certainly cannot say that much for their proposed road. We at Cornucopia are situated at an elevation of 2300 feet above Pine Valley, and today far prefer our snow to the mud of Pine and Eagle valleys, and would consider it no small advantage to have just such deep snow as we had this winter between here and Hogem, knowing by practical experience that we could haul more and easier over this snow road than over the fathomless muddy roads of these valleys. We say, therefore, let us have the snow in preference to wagons for four months at least, and we will save thereby a great deal, as it will be unnecessary to reload from wagon' to sleigh or vice versa, as we pass from mountain to valley. And the advantage of a saving in distance would be lost, and little or nothing gained by changing to these valleys, but I have often heard that time is not of much value to onr old Oregonian friends. but we beg them to mind that such is not the case with us miners, as that is one of the most important considerations. Why such insinuations for any proposed change should be rebuffed is: The donation by the State was made for the express purpose of helping to develop our mines in this district. Now it may be unknown or ignored by these hay diggers that this new road as surveyed by Griffiths will traverse and approach in many places. mining localities which may rival, if not surpass any locality in the State." The writer of the above is correct in his conclusions that snow is preferable to mud, and that the road to be built by the State on the Griffiths survey will be the only practicable route to the mines in the winter. We can further inform him, and others, who are ignorant of the fact, that this road will be build in due course of time, and that it cannot be built on any other survey without forfeiting the appropriation made by the State. What the people of Baker City do in regard to building roads will not concern him in the least. If they can succeed in making a better road to the mines. than the one made by the State, (and we admire their pluck in trying) they will be benefitted, and deserve to be, but their efforts to overreach Union as a supply point for the mines, will be furtile, as time will demonstrate. The natural advantages are all with us, and us an old granger remarked, "You can't buck agin nature without gittin huft."


