There is a move on foot to have the registration law declared unconstitutional. Au injunction suit was brought in the State Circuit Court at Portland, on Wednesday, against the County Court of Multnomah County to restrain it from putting the registration law into effect, The judge, after hearing the argument, decided that there was no equity in the bill of complaint presented, that the plaintiff was not entitled to any relief, and dismissed the bill. The case will be carried to the Supreme Court, which will fully test the constitutionality of the law. It will be a good thing to have this case disposed of, as it has been a 15-puzzle to the county courts throughout the State.

THE Germain Board of Agriculture has sent to Prince Bismark a resolution advising him that as the world is suffering from the depreciation of silver, extraordinary means should be restored to, with the object of raising the price of that metal. Germany, the resolution says, should do her utmost to support all the efforts that may be made to that end. The Government, it is suggested, should negotiate with England, with a veiw of inducing that country to join with Germany in the coinage of silver of full value, and



# An Assessment Law.

Some of the principal features of the proposed tax bill, prepared by the tax commission. The bill provides for the assessment and taxation of all real and personal property in the state, and of all personal property of the residents of the state. No matter where it may be, railroad, insurance, express, telephone, sleeping-car, wagon-road and bridge companies, shall be taxed on their gross receipts, telegraph companies on miles of wire. The true cash value of mortgages having been ascertained shall be assessed to the morgagee and morgagor in proportion to their respective interests. Each county shall be divided into as sessment districts and the assessor shall appoint a deputy, subject to the approval of the County Court, for each district, who shall adjust assessments in accordance with the true cash value of all property. Assessments shall be made upon all property as it existed on the first day of April in each year, and the roll must be complete on the 15th day of May. Taxes of all classes, state, county. road and school district shall be pay-
