The St Paul Pioneer Press says of the recent Chinese movements in this state and Washington territory that the necessary consequences will be the concentration in a few of the larger cities of all the Chinese now in the states and territories of the Pacific coast, Oregon City sends them to Portland, Seattle sends them to San Francisco. In a little while, if this goes on, thousands of them will be congregated in the populous centers. We know just what this means. We know what has been done in San Francisco, what will be done again and done more inhumanly when the crowding in of Chinese refugees begins to swell their numbers in the cities. There, in their last asylum, outrages will be perpetrated on a larger scale, and disturbances of public order will be more certain and dangerous. With all the Chinese of the Pacific coast collected in one or two points, a terrible catastrophe is certain.

"He has been a faithful worker at the polls for the party; he ought to have some office." This is a common cry. The political worker should not receive office. The man who has been a "worker at the polls" in the usual acceptance of the phrase should not be entrusted with the responsibility of office.
