We have and by Geo, Beidleman, Union striven for some time to get at the facts in the case, and have read with much interest, the communications written to this paper by ' 'Tax-payer' concerning the numerous errors made in that report, and was in hopes they would serve to elicit the truth, and be the means of everybody coming to a correct understanding of the matter. It will be seen, however, that every effort has been futile. Mr. Bell, in his lengthy article, does not touch on the question in which the people are most interested, and ignores the statements and questions of "Taxpayer,'' as Mr. Outhouse the "expert'' has done. The former talks to little purpose, the latter remains as dumb as an oyster. We confess that the case is hopeless. It is a fact, however, very patent to all, that the democratic party is, in a measure, responsible for all this. At least Outhouse and his gang are responsible for it, and as they seem to have full swing, and rule the roost at present, the party at large will have to suffer for their actions. Looking at it from an unbiased standpoint it is but right it should. Any party that will be ruled, bulldozed and deceived by such rotten fossils is but courting defeat, and will doubtless be successful in its wooing.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The democracy of Union county, in convention assembled, this week placed in the field their standard bearers, and candidates for official position. With two or three exceptions the nominees are trustworthy and capable men, so far as we know, and if elected, will doubtless prove to be good and efficient public servants. Two things, however, will militate against their success at the polls next June-first, the part taken in the convention by the old clique of political wire pullers, and manipulators of this county, and who, as one of the delegates facetionsly expressed it, "had the convention by the tail." and, secondly, the manner in which the candidates were elected as to location-five being from La Grande and vicinity, and three from Indian valley, the great southern portion of the county being unrecognized, save by a lonesome representative from Eagle valley. This arrangement would have been all right had it been impossible to get the right kind of men elsewhere, but in this case that difficulty did not arise. Time will show the wisdom or folly of the arrangement. There can be no doubt that if the republicans huprove the opportunity, put up the proper men, and can distribute them judiciously, they have a better chance of success than they ever had before. When the republican nominations are made, we will discuss the relative merits of the various candidates.





SUGAR MANUFACTURE.

The last issue of the Albany Democrat states that Prof. W. S. Walker analyzed the Oregon beet with the following results:

Pure crystalized cane sugar on first reduction, 4 per cent. A syrup, the usual result, was more difficult of treatment than usual; but, upon being rediluted and distilled, it yielded 5 per cent of alcohol. The true estimate is therefore. 6 and one half per cent of cane sugar.

Here in Oregon, where farmers raise beets that are as large around the waist as a lad who has just entered his teens, this item is of vist importance. There is eight cents worth of sugar and ten cents worth of alcohol in the average Oregon beet. The net worth of the beet is not less than ten cents. Think of it. One acre of beets within reach of market would be worth not less than \$500. Is it economy to rely upon the southern states and Sandwich Islands for our sugar when we are blest with such untural resources, and satisfaction guaranteed. in this direction at home.

The movement that is being made to introduce Chinese labor into the far eastern states is the best strike yet made for the working men of the Pacific. Thousands of Chinese are now taking advantage of cheap railroad rates and going cast to meet with a cordial reception. Let them go.


