THE LABOR TROUBLES.

President Cleveland in his wisdom has seen fit to recommend that congress appoint a permanent board of commissioners for the purpose of looking into, and investigating the cause of labor strikes, which have recently been of frequent occurrence, and by which trade has been partially paralyzed, honest workmen thrown out of employment, which has caused more or less suffering, and human infe has been sacrifised, all of which has been the outgrowth of a conflict between employers and employees. We suppose this commission would be invested with the power of not only finding whether the causes which led, or in the future may lead to the open rebellion of the Knights of Labor, are just causes, and that the Knights of Labor are either right or wrong, but to compel either the employers or employees to settle the difficulties between them upon the terms proposed by such commissioners. Otherwise it would seem to us that if the latter power is not Tickets, Including Supper, \$2.50. delegated to them, that merely having the authority to investigate the cause of strikes, leaving the settlement of the difficulties to the parties directly concerned, or to await the action of legislative measures, would be a mere farce. In our bumble opinion, the appointment of such a board would in no way facilitate the adjustment of the difficulties between the employers and emplocees to any considerable extent. It might for the moment, but it would be just as hard to arrive at an amicable settlement of the differences as if left between the parties themselves. If the laws of the different states in regard to unlawful gatherings cannot or will not now be enforced against such revolts, how much better will it be, or how much more rigidly will the laws be enforced at the dictation of a few men constituted to devise means of settlement? Will their proposals to the parties be acceeded to any more readily than the propositions of either of the parties themselves? We do not believe in capital or moneyed corporations grinding the laborer down because it is in their power so to do. Neither do we believe that labor should so antagonize capital that the business of the country should suffer stagnation thereby. Capital, it is true, is potent, the same is true of labor, Both should go hand in hand. Capital should receive a fair profit on its investments, and labor should likewise receive a fair compensation for its service. We believe in the Knights of Labor defending themselves against the real wrongs-not the fancied ones, that may be unduly imposed upon them by an unscrupulous corporation. We likewise believe in capital and corporations defending themselves against the dietations of any body of men, who choose to coerce any corporation into submission of their terms of some fancied wrongs. The results of such strikes do not tend to gain the sympathy of those who coolly look upon the matter with unbiased minds, and if any sympathy really exists, it is generally dispelled by the parties engaged coming in direct and open hostilities, ending in the shedding of human blood, in which, as most cases have turned out, innocent parties have been the

EDUCATION IN THE SOUTH.


victims.

The Blair educational bill is probably beaten; that is it is likely to sleep for the rest of the session, and that sleep means its ultimate death. The bill is opposed by Watterson of the Courier-Journal, and by a number of the ablest men in the South, upon the sensible ground that the South is perfeetly able to educate its own people, and that if the government grants it a subsidy for its schools it will never tax. itsetf any more than at present for education. The South pays a very small tax now for education compared with any northern state, and what it needs now is stimulus to local state pride, not a government appropriation. To stake the South now would make it behave like a smart but indolent fellow, who, as long as he can borrow money readily of his friends, will not work his talent for what it is worth for ; self-support. The quarterly review of industrial progress, just published by the Manufacturers' Record, proves by its reports that there is a wonderful growth of prosperity throughout the South. Among the new enterprises organized within the three months there were 4 iron furnaces, 3 cotten mills, 19 ice factories, 17 machine shops and foundaries, 3 stove foundaries, 4 agricultural implement factories, 18 flour mills, 24 tobacco factories, 7 fur-niture factories, 9 gas works, 12 elec-

THE WEEKLY OREGON SCOUT, trie light works, 7 carriage and wagon factories, 28 mining companies, and 110 lumber mills, including saw mills, sash and door factories, stave and cooperage factories, etc. The total amount of capital stock of incorporated companies, invested in new manufacturing and mining enterprises at the South, and in the enlargement of old plants and the rebuilding of mills \$36,557,000, against only about \$21,. 000,000 for the corresponding period of 1885. Of course this record disposes of the absurd claim that the South cannot afford to educate its illiterate at its own expense .- [Oregonian.




