THE Chinese indemnity bill is before congress. The opposition to the bill, which calls for only \$147,000, is discreditable when we recall the fact that when thirty years ago in a Cauton riot, the property of American residents was destroyed by a mob, a million of dollars was claimed from China for compensation. The amount actually conceded, without any haggling, was \$735,000, and its distribution was left entirely to the American government, This sum was so liberal that it paid all claims with \$150,000 to spare. In all cases where property of Americans in China has been damaged by mobs, a demand has been made for indemnity and satisfaction given. In cases arising after the payment of the Canton fund the fact that the

American government had in its po-session a large surplus from that indemnity was naturally a serious drawback to the American representatives in pressing the settlement of other claims; but in all the negotiations the Chinese officials, with great dignity, refrained from alluding openly to that circumstance.
