

COMMUNISM.

The United States grand jury of Seattle have returned true bills against several of the men who were indicted for conspiracy under the Ku Klux act, for participation in the anti-Chinese disturbances last February.

"In our investigation of crimes growing out of the expulsion of Chinese people from Seattle and Puget sound, we have much evidence, both documentary and oral, before us, revealing the existence throughout this country of a treasonable organization known as the 'Red American Industrial Workmen's Association.'"

Other information is given, and proofs produced of a very startling nature, and the evidence, it is said, cannot be disputed. The matter may be exaggerated, but there can be no doubt that the socialistic and nihilistic sentiments which have been imported to this country by the rabble of other countries, is like a cancer growing and gaining ground, and will soon develop a malignancy that will call for prompt and decisive exorciation.

Mr. Braughton, of Albany, Wis., who is a successful farmer, read a pithy and able paper, at the Dartington Institute, on the "Successful Farmer." In it he gives his pithy and amusing recipe, "How to Fail," as follows: "Be as ignorant as possible; put off till to-morrow what should be done to-day—worship the god of laziness, trust all to luck; leave farming tools out in the grass to rot, then run in debt for new machinery; kick the cow that gives the milk; let the stock perish for want of care; earn \$10 and try to pay \$15 with it; lie when the truth would answer better; buy whiskey to please the saloon keeper; go to auction sales and buy old trumpery; indorse notes for dead beats; go to law for the benefit of the poor lawyer; give your fattest Plymouth Rocks to the preacher; neglect your wife and tell her how fat she is growing old and brag how handsome widow Bedott is; get drunk at the fair and bet on a horse race; neglect the hogs, and when they die call it the hog cholera; do as the lightning-rod man tells you; get cheated twice by the same fellow; go it blind when you have good eyes; vote for your party, even against your own interest; keep changing your mode of farming; sell low and buy high; pay out cash for what you don't need and get trusted for what you must have; marry for love, only, and make a fool of yourself; live in a fool's paradise, and call it felicity; when you fail call it bad luck, when it is bad management."

An Illinois editor had forty-three delinquent subscribers jerked up for not paying their subscriptions. The editor obtained judgment in each case for the full amount of his claim. Of that number twenty-eight made affidavit that they owned no more property than the law allowed, thus preventing attachment. The twenty-eight, under the decision of the Supreme Court, were arrested for petty larceny, and bound over in the sum of \$300 each. All but six gave bonds. The six failing to give bail, were sent to jail. Should such a law be enforced in Oregon additions would have to be built to every jail in the state to hold the annual crop of subscribers who fail to pay for their papers.

An exchange sounds the true bugle note when it says: "It is a great pity that the people cannot have a little common sense in dealing with newspapers. Every day some one comes into the office to ask for a favorable notice of himself or his business. Now, the business of publishing a newspaper is like any other business—it is done for money—and there is no more reason why it should give its space and time of its employees to help other people than there is for a grocer to give away his sugar, or an attorney his eloquence. Newspaper publishers are more imposed upon in this way than anybody else in the community, and it is time they should try to protect themselves."

ADMINISTRATION is recovering lands from railroad corporations which have in the last few years been lavishly bestowed. The Kansas Pacific has been compelled to surrender 900,000 acres and the Union Pacific 1,200,000. It is said the Land Commissioner now has over 20,000,000 ready to be cut up into farms, all recovered from grasping railroad monopolies. The day for giving away public territory seems to have passed.
