## Local and General.

THE WALLOWA VALLEY -This valley is in the north-east corner of Union county. Oregon. It is about 75 miles in length and averages 15 miles in width. Its elevation above the sea level is from 3.500 to 4,500 fect. Its population is 3,500, and its towns are Its population is 5,300, and its towns are Lestine, Alder and Joseph. Stages run dai-ly, connecting these towns with the 0, R, & N, Co's, railway at La Grande, 76 miles from Joseph. The valley has doubled in its wealth and population in the past three years. The Wallows is noted for its pure air and water, healthful climate and beauti-ful scenery. Bich silver mines and extensive deposits of the best quality of marble in the United States are being developed in different parts of the valley. Wheat, oats, rye, barley, petates and the bardier vere-tables are produced in great abundance. and yield more to the more than any other part of Eastern Oregon. The great extent of wild pasture land makes the valley an excellent stock country. The theusand acres of variant reveniment lami renders the Wallowa a desirable locality for persons seeking homes in the far west .- Chieftain.

THE ELECTION .- The official returns from the various precincts of the county have not all been received up to the time of going to press, and we are therefore unable to publish them this week. There is little doubt, however, that the democratic licket is elected, with the exception of Berry, can dicate for sheriff, who was traded off. Next week we will publish a table, showing the vote cast in each precinct for each candi-date. As for the State officers, it now looks as if Waldo and McBride had won over Strahan and Gibons, but nothing will be determined till the returns are all in. It is needless to say that Pennoyer and Webb are elected by large majorities over Corne-lius and Marston, and that Hermann, Baker and McElroy are elected beyond a doubt.

WHEAT .- There appears to be no disposition among the holders of wheat to sell last year's crop, even yet, and the local market is waning. Yesterday, the mills here were offering 61%, with but a slight de-sire to do business. The Oregon City mills are using the "inland empire" or Walla Walla, which they get ten cents per bushel Walls cheaper than Valley, hence the weakness in the local market. There is very little talk of export, and local requirements are re-ported light. As far as can be learned, the coming crop is fully up to the average, over the world, and especially in the United States, and the prospect for good prices af-ter harvest is not good.— Salem Statesman.
