WORD comes from the East, from the great financial and trade center of the country, that there is a more encouraging outlook for business; that prominent financiers and capitalists, crowd and practical manufacturers, merchants and business men, unite in declaring that the country is again "on the up grade;" that capital has early recovered the confidence which was temporarily destroyed by the great strikes and violent agitations of the spring months, and that a healthy and prosperous trade may be looked for. This view is not predicted upon the reasoning of any one person. It is a summary of the publicly expressed and published opinions of some of the best known and most prominent business men in America.

THE time has come when there ought to be an appointment of the late in the matter of representation to the Legislature, and it ought to be completed at the coming session. "Vision ought also to be made for the holding of a constitutional convention. The State Constitution is no longer adapted to the changed condition of the State. We suggest that senators and representatives give us their serious consideration.

It is said that much dissatisfaction manifested at the order of the treasury to stamp the word "light" on every gold coin presented at the sub-treasury found to be one-half of one cent below standard weight. This is so stamped have to be sold in Illinois, thus entailing serious loss on holders. Coins even slightly worn will thus no longer pass current. The measure is viewed as particularly vexatious to the people of a coast, gold being the chief circulating medium, paper money not being much used.

By the recent order of the Interior department, saw mills in Alaska are permitted to cut logs and manufacture the same into lumber, except the personal use of the proprietors said mills. The order is based on a fact that there are no land laws in that Territory, and no person can acquire ownership to real property. Only persons who have title to an estate are a few Russians who need land in Sitka at the time of the transfer of the Territory to the United States.

A HOME RULE agitation has sprung in Wales, where the people are tiring from grievances like those Ireland. The desire for local self government is likely to spread, and early there have been mutterings of content in Scotland. If England could find herself the only contented of the United Kingdom, she might change her mind about the duties of regulating the domestic affairs of other people.
