The Gazette evidently misinterpreted our remarks last week, in regard to immigration. So far as local immigration is concerned—the moving of our own people from one section to another-the evacuation of the crowded East to fill up the less crowded West, may be well enough, and if it were not well enough, could not be helped; but our article lost week referred to foreign immigration, and we repeat again that it is not wanted, and if it were in our power we would lay as strict an embargo against immigration from every nation under the sun as we are now endeavoring to enforce against China. We want no opium fiends from China, no agitators from Ireland, no paupers from England, no vampires from the nihilistic hot-beds of Russia and Germany, and no ignorant besotted rabble from Italy. The objection to this class of people from the various countries of the old world applies with even greater force to the wealthy, titled and influential classes. We want none of their monied land grabbers and powerful corporations to gobble up our domains and hurry on a system of landlordism and serfs, such as Europe is cursed with. We want none of their lords, dukes, counts. etc., with their infernal ideas of "no-bility," and class distinctions. In fact, we want nothing to do with any of them, and the American who in any way encourages or sanctions the immigration of ignorant serfs or wealthy blood-suckers to this land, is an enemy of his countrymen and should be regarded as such. The placing of agents in Loudon or anywhere else tor the purpess of "inducing immigra-tion" is absurd, if not in a sense criminal, and whoever it is done bycompanies or legislative bodies-you may rest assured that there is no patriotism or desire for the general good in the proceeding, but that deep down under it all is a scheme for personal gain. This country has been "offering inducements' to the rabble of the world long enough, and it is about time for the business to be vetoed by Americans, if they still retain the power to do so.

Deady delivered an opinion in the U S. district court, recently, in the case of the United States against Reed and Eccles. 
