Portland, Or., April 26, 1887.

Beef receipts at the yards quite heavy for the week and prices were well sustained by the presence of a Victoria buyer, which drained the market close and prices remained firm. The sheep market was drawn upon heavily by a buyer from the Sound, clearing market bare; hog receipts, quite heavy, and prices firm; in blooded cattle, some 20 head were sold by G. A. Fletcher; stock cattle continue to move freely; moderate move in work horses. Arrivals of stock for the week:

April 20.—Beef, 80 head; hogs, 300 head; sheep, 304 head.

April 21.—Stock cattle, 302 head; draft horses, 14 head; beef 100 head.

April 22.—Sheep, 214 head; stock cattle, 398 head.

April 23.—Blooded stock, 41 head.

April 24.—Work horses, 60 head; beef, 20 head; sheep, 100 head.

April 25.—Sheep, 120 head; work horses, 85 head; beef, 20 head.

Pine Nuts.

Times living up considerably. Quite a stampede of emigrants to this valley and camp.

The clay spoken of in my last letter is pronounced by experts to be the genuine fire clay of a very fine quality. We understand that the Irwin brothers will commence work immediately and try a kiln of three hundred thousand brick (not three thousand as you erroneously printed last week).

Mr John Irwin and family arrived yesterday. Mr Irwin evidently means business as he purchased Mr John Hughes' 80 acre ranch today. He brought quite an acquisition to the valley with him in the shape of a triplet of full blooded Poland China pigs and a twenty-two hundred weight full blooded Durham bull and heifer. This kind of stock is much needed in the valley.

We would humbly suggest, since the wagon road up the canyon to camp is attracting so much attention, and is so economical to organize a company and construct an elevated car track from Langley's mill to Cornucopia, a distance of about six miles. It seems to the writer that it could be built as cheap if not cheaper, and much quicker than to grade a wagon road. As one good horse could haul as much in this way as three span could haul on an ordinary wagon road; freight could be transported much cheaper. For instance, Make what is called trestles consisting of one mud sill, two posts and a cap of round timbers spliced and spiked, then two stringers hewed level on upper side, then for each 2x4 scantling spiked on four feet apart, then three 2x12 inch plank spiked between for one or three horses hitched tandem; car six feet wide with flanges on wheels to fit rails. Toward winter the track could very easily be snow checked, and would make a safe and comfortable transit at all times of the year. An easy grade could be made this way by having come of the trestles short and come longer to suit the variations of the ground. This however, is merely a suggestion. We will undoubtedly have one or two railroads in the near future, but railroad companies are generally huge concerns, and move slowly. We need something at once to meet the immediate demand, no matter how rude so it is substantial, speedy and reliable. For fear I am encroaching on your valuable space and time, I subscribe myself,

What Union Sorely Needs.

EDITOR SCOTT:—Your correspondent knows very well that it is not exactly right to debate the needs and requirements of an incorporated town, because it is to be supposed that men who can realize the needs of such incorporation are at the head of it, but the temptation is too great this time, and cannot be resisted. Union is a very lively business place; has some good buildings, and is the county seat of a prosperous county. The citizens are an industrious, energetic, clever class of people, and are very deeply interested in the welfare of their county and town, but still they can be blamed to a certain extent for negligence. Caution is not exercised in procuring sufficient defense against danger. Within the last few months several small fires have occurred; and no doubt the town will suffer terribly from these "small" fires yet, if it has been very lucky in the past. There is nothing that time a blaze will occur, and so the town by all means, should be prepared to make some resistance. Willing hands, of course are excellent, but they should have something to work with. There has been organized for several years past a fire brigade, but the greatest need now is a good engine—one that will make a work when put at work. Why not thoroughly organize the old fire company, and purchase an engine and general fire apparatus, and be prepared for any emergency? An engine would not cost a great amount and it may save considerable in a few years. Let the populace reflect, and perhaps some steps will be taken in this matter.

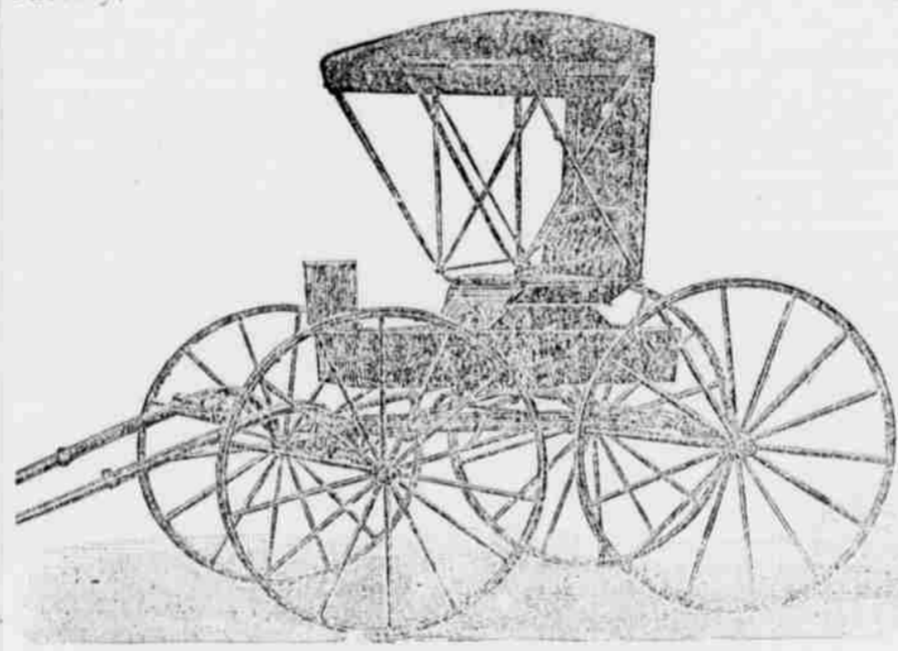

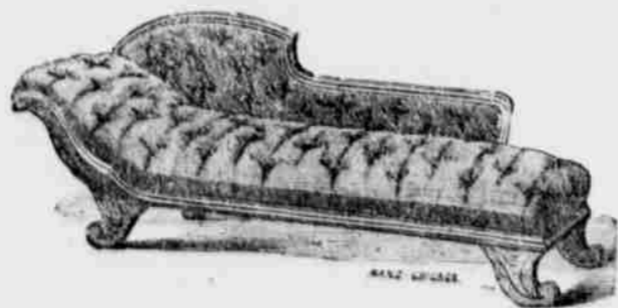
