COUNTY COURT NOTES.

Road petitioned for by E. B. Gaylord et al.—No proof of posting notices presented, the matter was deferred till some future time for consideration.

Road petitioned for by L. Loyd et al.—No proof of posting notices appearing, the matter was deferred.

Liquor license granted to Owen Mathews to sell spirituous liquors in the town of Cornucopia, for a period of six months.

Ordered that the sum of one thousand dollars be appropriated by the county court to assist in placing that part of the county road lying between Cornucopia and a point near Langrell's mill, in good repair, and that the said money be disbursed by a superintendent appointed by the court, who shall have the power to make slight changes in the line of said road, where in his judgement such changes would make a better grade, or otherwise improve the road.

Road petitioned for by E. Hager, et al.—It appearing that all proceedings herein have been regular, road declared a public highway and ordered opened according to law.

Liquor license granted to W. H. Griggs & Co. in the town of Elgin, for a period of six months.

Road petitioned for by Wm McKimble et al.—Remonstrance filed protesting against the establishment of the proposed road as viewed, for the reason that the viewers and surveyor did not follow the line as described in petition. Ordered that J. N. Young, G. W. Banehoff and John Fewell be appointed as viewers and H. W. Cook, surveyor, to again view and survey the road, and report to the court; to meet at Pineville & Wilkinson's store on May 24th, 1887 at 10 o'clock a. m. and qualify before commencing work. Matter continued till next term of court.

In the matter of petition asking that C. D. McDowell be appointed Justice of the Peace of Summerville precinct to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of F. S. Paul.—It appearing that said F. S. Paul has withdrawn his resignation, and therefore there being no vacancy, petition dismissed.

It appearing that R. A. Nance, deceased, was Justice of the Peace of Indian Valley precinct, at the time of his death, and at the time his justice docket and other books belonging to the said office, are in a certain satchel now in the possession of Wm. McWilliams of Elgin, and it appearing that J. H. Cowan has been appointed Justice of the Peace to fill the vacancy, it is ordered by the court that J. H. Cowan and John F. Chrisman be appointed a committee to examine said satchel, and to turn over to the present Justice of the Peace, all papers and books belonging to the office, and the satchel to the widow of the deceased.

In the matter of a claim and settlement with Mrs. D. B. Saunders, administratrix of estate of A. L. Saunders, while he was sheriff of Union county, it was found that \$874.40 is still due and owing to said estate. The clerk ordered to draw warrants for \$700. of this, in favor of the estate. Account left open till next term of court for final settlement.

In the matter of the petition of Wm. Wilson for rebate on liquor license paid for under the Keady law, which has been declared unconstitutional.—The matter being argued before the court by the respective attorneys, and the court being fully advised on the premises, the claim was rejected and disallowed.

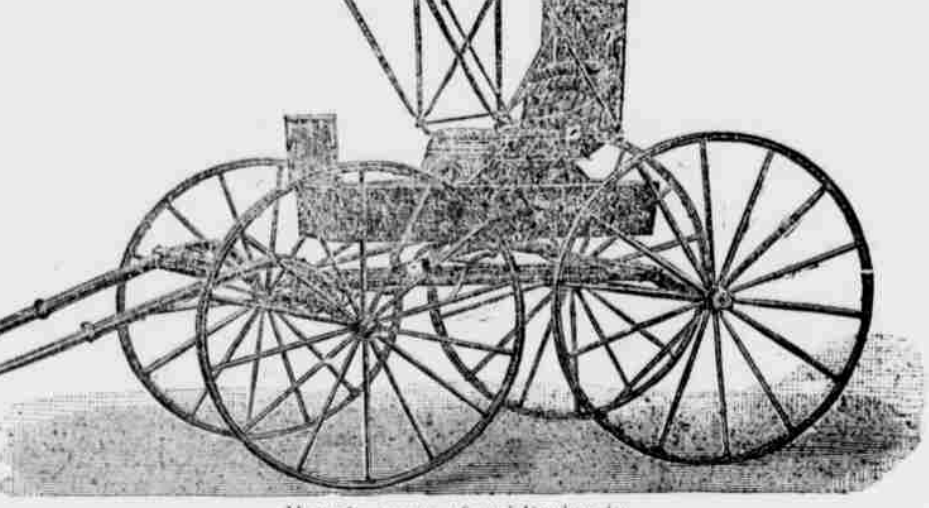
