

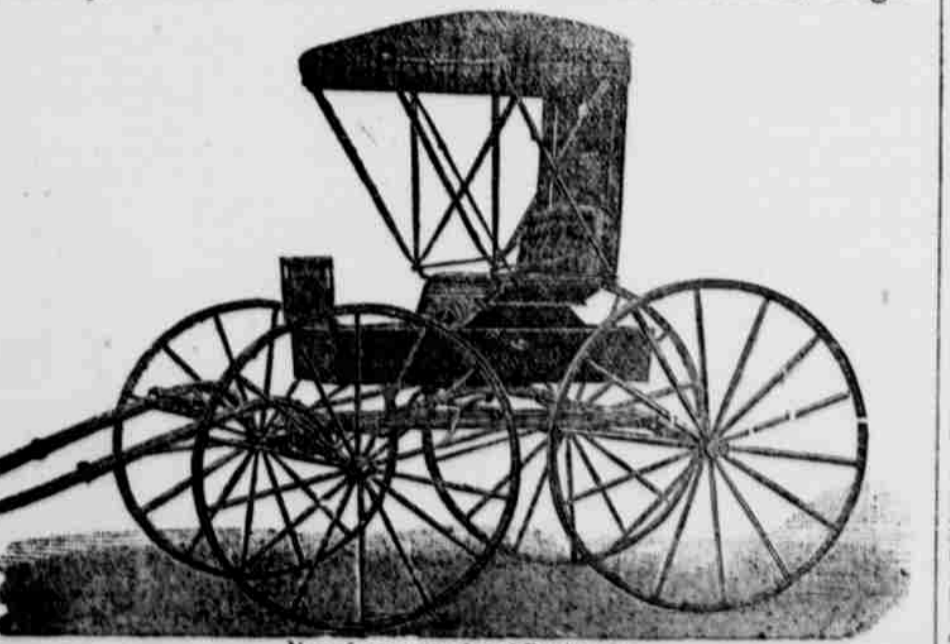

The election of the next President of the United States may have been decided in Little Rhode Island last Tuesday, as the vacancy filled in its Congressional delegation by the election of a Republican would enable the party to control a majority of the States and elect their candidate for President, in case the election should be thrown into the House of Representatives as it was in 1824, when John Quincy Adams was chosen.

If credence can be given to a communication received in this city a few days ago from the captain of a steamer sailing the Mexican gulf, the great collection of scientific treasures of the National Museum is to be enriched by the addition of the head of a veritable sea serpent, captured after a desperate and bloody struggle, in which the ship came near being capsize—the marlin-ponter having been decapitated after it was found impossible to make other headway against this terror of "those who go down to the sea in ships".

The annual report of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury this week, contains some interesting information, showing as it does, the condition of our internal system of taxation. The total collections for the fiscal year ended June 30th, 1887, were \$118,829,523, an increase of about two million dollars over the same period for 1886, and of about four million dollars for the year preceding. For the last fiscal year the receipts were \$827,523 in excess of the estimates. As compared with last year there was a decrease of two and a half million gallons of spirits in quantity deposited in distillery warehouses.
