CONSTITUTION. This organization shall be known as the Union Board of Trade.

OBJECTS. 1. The nature of business to be transacted by this board shall be that calculated to pro-mote the manufacturing, mercantile and commercial interests of the city of Union.
2. The business management shall be vested in eight members, the president and vice-president to be ex-officio members

3. The said Union Board of Trade shall exist until dissolved according to law, by the concurring vote of at least a majority of

4. The by-laws shall designate the officers of the board, and prescribe their duties, the condition of admission and qualification of members.

Preamble.—In order to promote the general prosperity of all the various interests of the city of Union and its vicinity, namely, its trade and commerce, its arts and manufactories, its banking, exchange and brokerage, its mineral, agricultural and horticultural interests, public improve-ments, its educational, professional, moral and benevolent interests, and to oppose by all honorable means, opposition to these advancements: to procure, preserve and disseminate information in relation to commercial, financial, and matters of general interest pertaining to the growth and de-velopment of the city of Union and its vi-cinity, the Union Board of Trade.

Residents of the city of Union and vicinity are eligible for membership, who will be required to subscribe to the constitution and by-laws.

From and after the adoption of these by-laws, the member-hip fee shall be \$—, with monthly dues of — cents, payable quarterly in advance. Any members in arears for one quarter, may be suspended, provided, always, that he shall pended, provided, always, that he shall have been given ten days' notice of such arrearage, and three months thereafter fail-ing to pay dues to date, his name shall be stricken from the roll of members. ARTICLE III.

Sec. 1. The government of the board shall

sec. 1. The government of the board shall be vested in the president and vice-president and eight directors, who shall be elected on the 1st Monday in January, 1859, and annually thereafter.

Sec. 2. There shall be a secretary and treasurer, who, together with such assistants as may be deemed necessary, shall be appointed by the directors at their first meeting, who shall hold their effices for one year or until their successors are appointed. year or until their successors are appointed. Sec. 3. Regular meetings shall be held monthly on the 1st Monday of each month. Special meetings may be called at the writ-

ten request of ten members. A special meeting of the directors may be called by the president, or upon the request of five members. At all regular meetings of the board, the number present shall constitute a quorum. At all meetings of the direcfive members shall constitute a quo-

Sec 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the board, and of the executive committee. He shall at the annual meetcommittee He shall at the annual meet ing of the board and at such other times a he may deem proper, communicate to the board such matters as he may deem advisable to promote the usefulness of the board, and shall perform such other duties as are necessarily incident to his office.

Sec. 2. In the absence of the president, the vice president shall perform his duties, In the absence of both president and vice-president, the board shall elect one of its

members to act pro-tem.

Sec. 3. The secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the board, and the record of the proceedings of the board of directors, of which he shall be ex-officio member, without a vote. He shall keep a record of all papers, books, statistics and information which may come into his hands. He shall make a report at each regular meeting of the board, of its transactions and such other reports as the board from time to time r quire. He shall under directions of the president give notice of all special meetings and appointments. He shall vollect, receive and keep a correct account of all moneys belonging to the board, and pay the same over to the treasurer monthly, ta king his receipt therefor.

Sec. 4. The treasurer shall receive from the secretary all moneys collected, pay bills and warrants audited by the directors, signed by the president and countersigned by the secretary. He shall keep an neu-rate account of all moneys received and disbursed, and make annual report of his doings, and such other reports as the directors may require.

ABTICLE Y Sec. 1. The directors shall have general supervision of the financial affairs of the board. All bills and accounts shall be approved by them before payment, and only on proper vouchers being presented. The directors may require such bonds from the secretary and treasurer as they may deem proper. Sec. 2 The directors shall fix the compon-

sation of the secretary and other officers and agents appointed by them, subject to approval by the board.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of systematically carrying out the full objects of the board, the directors are authorized to appoint the following committees from the membership at large, the committees to consist of three members each, one of each of such committee to be a member of the board of directors, who shall act as chairman: First, committee on manufacturing interests; 2. committee on railroads and transportation 3, committee on public property and improvements; 4, committee on license and legislation; 5 committee on fire and water works; 6, committee on roads and thoroughfares; 7, committee on mercantile interests: 8, committee on statistics and advertising They may also appoint special committee from time to time as the interests of the board may require. The directors shall di-rect the committees to hold a meeting once a month if they deem the interests of the board demand, and if such committees fail so to meet for two consecutive months, the directors shall appoint a new committee to act instead of such failing committee.

Sec. 4. Vacancies, caused by death, resignation or other causes, shall be filled at the next regular meeting of the board, for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE VI. Sec. I. These by-laws may be altered or amended at the next regular meeting, at which such alterations or amendments in
