EEC. 5. A person finding any swine running at large contrary to the provisions of this act, and any constable of any precinct, or marshal of any city, of his county where such swine may be found, on view or information shall take up and confine the same forthwith, giving notice thereof to the owner, if known, and if not known, by posting notices describing such animals therein in at least three public places within the precinct, and if the owner does not appear and claim his property, and pay all charges for taking up, advertising and keeping the same, within ten days from the date of notice the sale of the animals may be proceeded with under the law relating to estrays.
