Where a man and a woman each make a homestead entry and marry before making final proof, one of the entries must be relinquished, or commuted, at their choice. If they live be sold for the tegether on one homestead, the entry covering the other homestead will be hable to contest for abandonment, even though the land be cultivated and improved. The homestead law requires three things to give limit fitle. first, honest residence, second, good of buildings, fences and the like. Compliance with only one or two of these requirements will not satisfy the law. The daughter of a deceased soldier, sailor or marine, if otherwise qualified, for her benefit, during her minerity.

A widow, as the legal representative of her deceased husband, may continue to cultivate his homestead and at the same time make an entry in larown name. A woman has this advantage over a man. She can thus secure two homesteads while he is allowed only one.

The widow of a deceased entryman may purchase, under the act of June 15, 1880, the land embraced in a homestead entry, in cases where that act is applicable
