

Graphic Pen Pictures of Scenes in the Orient.

Genoa, Italy, Dec. 12 1888

EDITOR OREGON SCOUT:

Thinking a few lines from the far off land of birds, and flowers, and sunny skies, might be of some interest to the people of your part of the globe I take the liberty of favoring you (if so it may be called) with a few crude lines that portray the beauties of Italia, to my own unpoetic fancy and eye.

We stepped off the "Germania" this bright and refreshing morning on to the crowded wharves of Genoa. About ten Americans disembarked here—all tourists.

The bay is alive with tiny white sailed boats, manned by the soft-eyed Italian boys, who ply the thin and delicate little oars with a dexterous hand. Some large vessels are lying at anchor off shore, some are continually arriving and occasionally a large, ponderous, man-of-war, or merchant craft weigh anchor, and leisurely drifts away down the shining bosom of the Mediterranean—farther and farther, until only a tiny speck is visible above the watery horizon. We wended our way through the thick crowd to "Main street," or the wide, white walled promenade that stretches out to the foot hills, where the little houses stand like some lone little tombstone, in the distance on the brow of one of Italia's flowery hills. People in dense throngs crowd the way, but at last, after patiently toiling along with valise in hand for a half-mile we found quarters that suited us. Our stopping place was a small, but neatly fitted cottage restaurant, situated on a commanding little knoll, where we could look far sea-ward. It has been a tiresome day, and but for the new, and striking scenes we would admit of being weary. From our windows to the south, we have one of the rarest panoramas that is found. Immediately below us is the city. The sun is fast sinking down over the western peaks, and as he sends a few last fragments streaming across the distant bosom of the wave-ribbed Mediterranean, a picture presents itself to our view that would lend a new inspiration to the magic brush of Michael Angelo—but alas, poor Angelo looked on scenes like this long years before our feet tread the classic shores of Italy. The cosy town lies nestled at our feet, now; the spires of the many churches and cathedrals are gilded with a few stray rays, and the droll looking little houses that are clustered so closely together look so sombre in the closing scenes of day. A sweet perfume comes stealing down the air, laden with coolness and vigor from the far off snow-crowned Alps, and with the perfume from the daintiest flowers that bloom in the sunny nooks by river Po. Here, a few hundred yards east, is a bit of landscape—and such a place it seems—the straight and triangular roads mark every field, and the long rows of bright green grape vines stretch off to the top of the hill; a flower garden blooms down close to the pass-way; every hue here vies for the queenship. Gradually the scenes grow darker, the town is silent, save the silvery tinkle of the bells on the flocks of goats that come skipping down the flowery pathway to their folds by the sea. The air grows richer with its deepening, and the influence seems like a vigor of life breathed from the very flowers. The gentle "swish, swash" of the subdued waves alone breaks the silence now. The tramp of feet has almost ceased, and now, clear on the evening air, comes the melodious strains of the carol chant. Soft-eyed Italian maidens, with sweet-voiced picalos, stand at the grim cathedral arches, and on these small, delicate instruments they pipe the richest melodies that Italian taste can construct, or Italian dexterity execute. The sound sinks and swells until the whole air seems resonant to its sweetness. The musician's fingers drop from the zealous task and the streets are as silent as the tomb. The full moon comes floating up from her bed behind the green-wreathed eastern hills, and the sea once more glows like a silver-ruflled sheet, with the broken waves leaping silently over one another; the softest skies look down on the sleeping scene; the moon-beams leap along down the wide, white promenade, until it seems a silver-lined chalice. Oh, could poor old Columbus step into his native city to-night. Its shining steeples, its gorgeous palaces, the long, white, ghost-like colonades and the sombre busts of Fra Giovanni. All these would make his bosom swell with pride at the fact of his having been once a son of these fair scenes.

Italy is pre-eminent in the natural beauties, if her Caesar and her Cicero are withered to dust. Columbus could wander back to his rusty, time-worn chains, and his sombre tomb in the sanctuary vaults of the old cathedral of Valledolida with a good will, if his dim eyes could rest for a few hours on the changed scenes of his childhood. The glories of Italy still live; her flowers shall never fade; her skies shall be ever cloudless; her name, one decked in the rarest festoons from the gardens of time. The fierce Hun could not crush beneath his heel the soil that nourished the genius. He may break the marble bust of Julius Caesar, but the pen and sword of Caesar shall never rust nor decay. 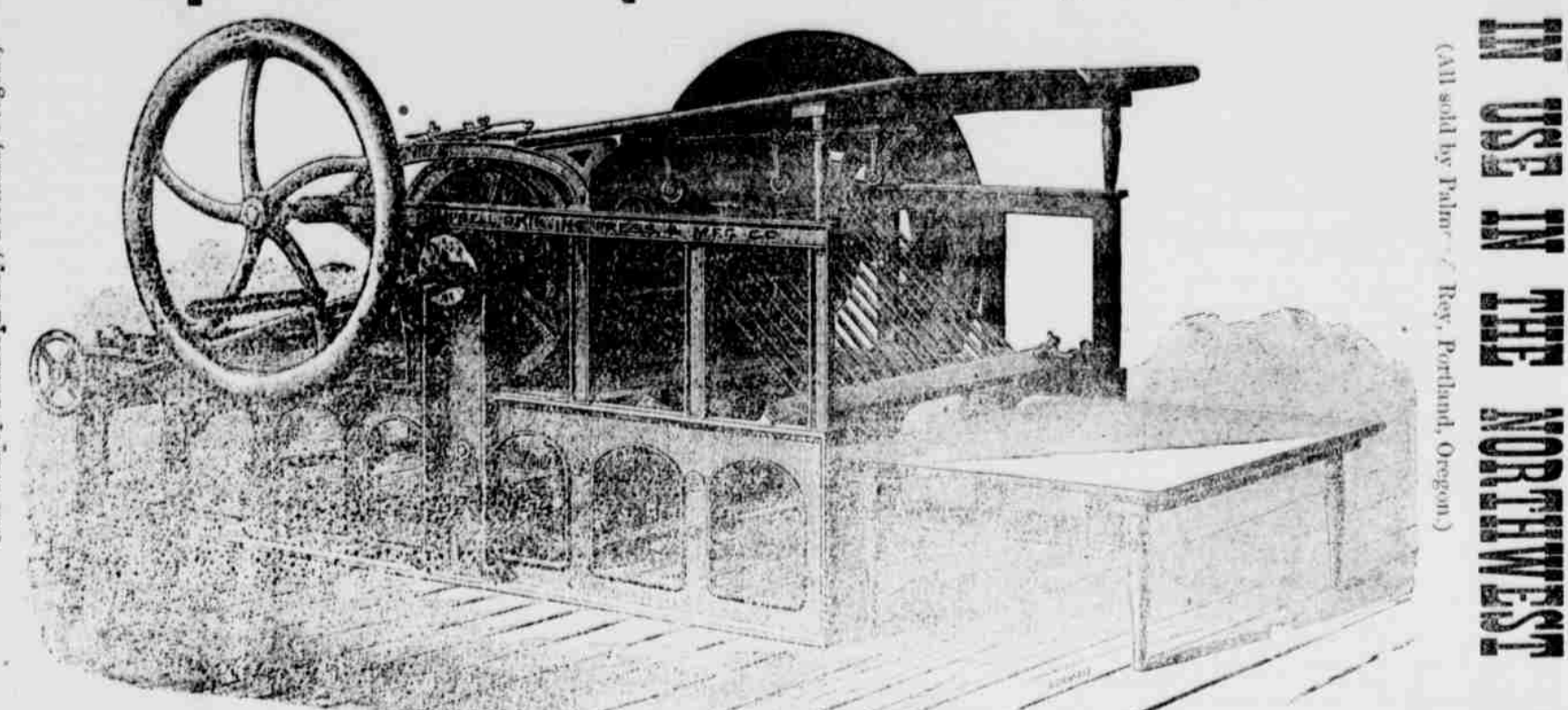
