An Interesting Letter From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, Jan. 18th, 1889.

Editor OREGON SCOUT—

The House of Representatives has wrestled with the Omnibus Territorial bill for several days, mostly in a decent and orderly manner. Mr. Springer and Mr. Cox were heard at length, after which the several delegates from the territories were given a chance. The result was that the Congressional Record of the following morning looked like the advertising sheet of a western real estate agency. It was one of the most thrilling numbers yet issued by that able journal, and should be read by all admirers of painstaking and artistic liars. It is expected that as the bill stands, the democrats not being united in its favor on the question of the division of Dakota, the proposed legislation will die in conference. Still the admirable energy displayed by the people of Dakota, and the large delegation of representative men of both parties sent here by the statehood meetings to urge division, may turn the tide of battle.

The contest in the House this week may seriously affect the fight for the speakership of the next House. In the debate over the report of the committee on rules, two candidates, Reed and Cannon, were skillfully placed on the defensive by the friends of McKinley and Burrows, and they succeeded in leaving Reed and Cannon to vote with the democrats. The defeat, if it may be called such, was of course more a defeat of Reed, whose leadership is avowed, than of Cannon. Reed's anger was plain to be seen. General Henderson is another mad candidate for the speakership. He says that the published report that his candidacy is only a subterfuge in Cannon's interest is a black lie.

The president has ordered General Swain, now suspended from the office of Judge Advocate General, before a retiring board. The order involves the remission of the sentence of the former court martial and a clearing of Swain's record. His sentence of suspension for twelve years would expire July, 1896. Retirement in his case, would not, however, involve a vindication of his honor. General Swain was regularly convicted, though his punishment was mild. General Black's friends are vigorously pushing his claims to succeed Swain. The only objection urged against him is that his physical disability, as established when his large pension was granted, would necessitate his retirement in two or three years at most. But General Black's friends claim that three republican senators will vote for his confirmation. There is an element of danger in the case. There are not lacking republican senators who long to investigate the pension office and score Commissioner Black. His nomination would afford the opportunity.

The election of Anthony Higgins as a senator from Delaware is welcomed with enthusiasm by the republicans and with personal satisfaction by such democrats as know him best. In the midst of the shouting, full praise is given to Senator Quay, whose letter to the Delaware republican, who seemed but a week ago involved in a destructive fight, brought about a speedy settlement of all difficulties. Blessed is the peacemaker. Lucky is Mr. Higgins. Two years ago the leader of a congressional forlorn hope, a politician hopelessly in the minority in a vest pocket owned by the Bayards and their kin, he is suddenly thrown on the crest wave of victory.

On Thursday, the one hundred and eighty-third anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, found the monument erected in his memory by Mr. Stiles Hutchins in front of the Post newspaper office, still awaiting unveiling. It appears that Mr. Hutchins has been for some time involved in a joint debate with the sculptor, a warfare that became aggressive when the sculptor placed his name as artist upon the base in letters five inches high. Mr. Hutchins, as an old newspaper man, didn't intend to give Mr. Sculptor a five inch advertisement forever free, so in the dark watches of the night he had the name cut off. It is to be regretted that like time and tide the anniversary of B. Franklin's birth, waits for no man.

Three large excursions went to Baltimore this week to Edwin Booth's performance. The fact that Mr. Booth never comes to Washington is so decided a "chesnut" that I must apologize for mentioning it. I am led to recall it by the fact that Tuesday night was the anniversary of the night he left Washington, several years after the assassination, with the bones of his misguided brother who killed President Lincoln. What memories might have come to him, even through the lines of Shylock, as he looked upon the Washington contingent that his vow of that fearful night had compelled to come to him, opens a vista of speculation. The ploughman, in tilled fields of peace, turns up the grinning skulls of war. J. R. C.

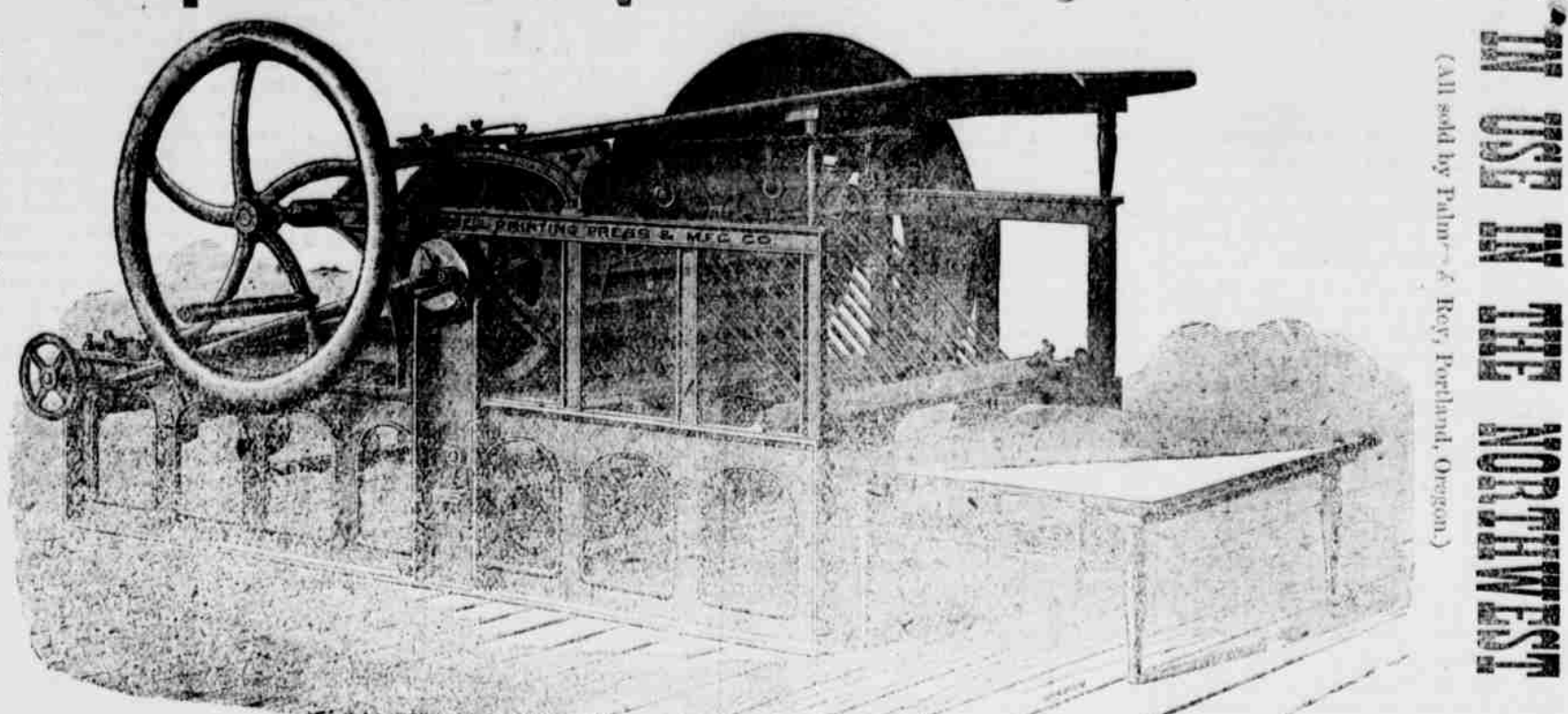
