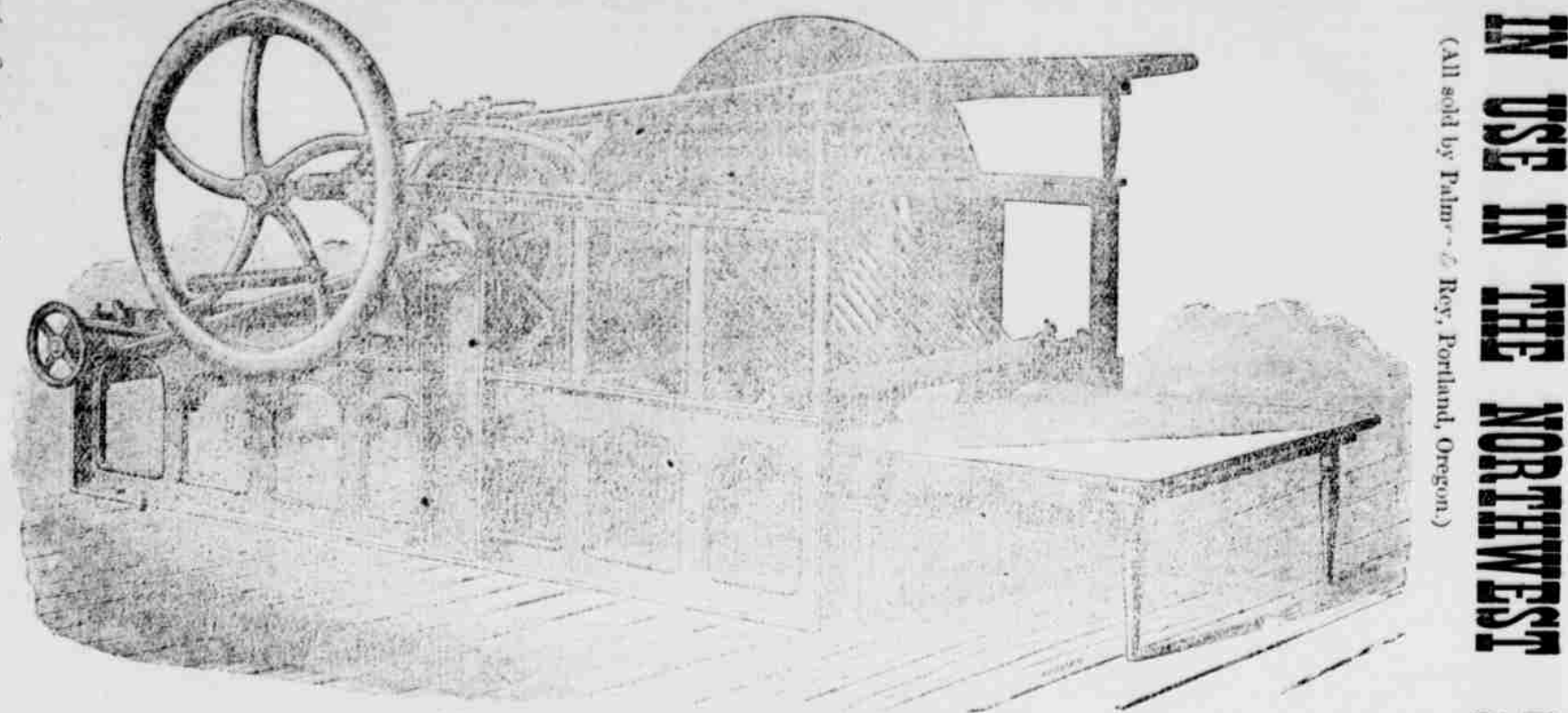

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT, PORTLAND, OREGON, February, 6th, 1889.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 1. The following extracts from the proceedings of the State Military Board at the regular meeting, held January 15th, 1889, are published for the information and guidance of the Oregon National Guard:

I.—Allowance for uniforms will be audited at the rate of seven dollars and sixty-five cents (\$7.65) per uniform for the actual number of uniforms purchased, less the amount already received from the State.

II.—Under section forty-eight of the militia law of the State, the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars will be audited for target practice, or \$168.66 to each regiment; this amount to be expended under the direction of the Colonel commanding the regiments.

III.—The question of proxies at the meeting of company officers for the election of field officers having been presented to the Board, it was the opinion of the board that such proxies may be held by any officer of the Oregon National Guard, since it is almost an impossibility for all company officers to be present, and such proxies are supposed to vote the choice of officers whom they represent.

IV.—The board had in consideration the case of Captain H. Cook, who had been tried by general court-martial and dismissed from the service of the State. It appeared to the board, from representation of some of the members of the court that tried him, that Captain Cook had an honorable record as a soldier previous to the time of his trial by court-martial; that he had already been punished sufficiently for the offense of which he was convicted. The board therefore recommend that the Governor of the State do what he can under the law to remove the disabilities which now exist in consequence of the sentence of the court.
