The selection of Senator Palmer for the post at Madrid is singularly inappropriate, in the light of precedent. For years we have sent to Spain gentlemen of scholarship and literary attainments. The libraries of Madrid teem with man-Prescotte, then our minister, wrote his the near future. enchanting stories of the conquests, and gave the Spainards a new idea of the ability of North Americans. Even Perry Belmont, basty and irrepressible as he may be, is still a man of fine scholarship and literary tastes. Senator Palmer is one of the most popular and sensible of millionaires, and would have made-what he so much desired to make-an excellent Secretary of Agriculture. But his knowledge of literature may be said to be bounded on one side by Michign lumber laws and on the other side by his bank book. Let us be thankful that the days when the wily Spanish diplomatics made one sided treaties and pulled the wool over the eyes of other diplomats and interfered in inter-national affairs, is over.

The appointment of Mr. Swift to the Japanese mission is regarded as something of a fall off for his high ambition. Perhaps California should have had higher representation. Even the minister to China-if his being a Californian would not prevent his acceeptance of the Chinese Court-would be of more advantage to the Pacific slope. However, Japan is so delighted with everything American that it may be well to send them one of our best after dinner speakers, and in that way Mr. Swift's selection is excellent

The selection of George Batcheller, of New York, as first assistant of the Treasury evinces a desire to bestow offices upon men who have done active party service. A week ago it appeared that Charles E. Coon was in the Treasury Department from boyhood and became a valuable official, being an unusually able man. When the Democratic administration numbered him among the slain, he went to New York and entered the employ of a banking house. He rather forgot the rural New York district where he had been reared, and lost his residence. During the last campaign he gave the Republican party moral support, but he did not get out the "hustle." In fact Mr. Coon had been so long an elegant society figure that it was quite out of his line. He therefore only claimed office as a common everyday patriot the Treasury Department business.
